FREEDOM OF IRISH PLAN OF CABINET

Proposal for Virtual Independence Under Consideration With Withdrawal of British Forces; Ulster to Be Left to Defend Itself.

Liberty May Become Actuality Very Soon

On Other Hand Bonar Law Intimates Measures for Strengthening Hold to Be Taken

LONDON, July 21 (UP).—A proposal for virtual independence for Ireland with a provision against interference by any foreign government in Irish affairs was understood to be under consideration by the British cabinet.

Under this scheme Great Britain would not regulate Irish independence but such independence would become an actual fact.

In some quarters it was stated the plan means cutting away all British official functions from Ireland, leaving the island to sink or swim.

It was believed that if the military was withdrawn and ammunition left in Ulster, nationalists would be able to defend themselves against aggressions of the Sinn Feinists.

Ulster would probably establish its own parliament and a government which would continue relations with the British empire.

On the other hand Andrew Bonar Law, other British cabinet official intimates that measures are under consideration for strengthening the present British legal and official structure in Ireland.

AMERICAN GOODS AND FOREIGN MARKETS.

THE recent State Department order lifting the embargo on trade with Soviet Russia, although it will result immediately in any decided change in trade relations between that country and the United States, stands out as the most astounding feature of the trade situation.

Commercially, the State Department's action probably means little at this time—politically, it can be taken as a far-sighted policy which may meet on and ultimately weaken the Bolshevik influence in Russia.

Present chaotic conditions in Russia will present serious difficulties to whatever trade may result from this country's action. Russia is in dire need of locomotives and railroad materials, but these, as well as many other commodities, are likely to be considered capable of being used for war purposes and their exportation therefore restricted.

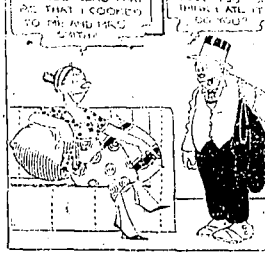

TILDEN IS "GOOD SPORT" AS NEW KING OF TENNIS COURTS

This spring he won the indoor national championship and, paired with young Vincent Richards, he was defeated for the singles title, he won the doubles championship.

With Richards he also won the doubles championship at Stratfield and the North and South tournament and another title, the Springhill Valley crown with Rodney Bowe.

Of Tilden's game, Paul Williams, secretary of the United States Lawn Tennis Association has the following to say:

"Tilden is pre-eminently a wide variety of strokes, from a slow teasing twist to a lightning like straight ball from the backcourt. He has both the chop and the drive, forehand and backhand.

Probably the most reasonable answer would be that the public face of tennis must be like that to win due to the heat, but all things being equal, the greatest stress seems to be put on the back for the heavy and weight championship, while the first weight comes next.

Attendance at the games was 32,000 at the first game, 30,000 at the second, 28,000 at the third, and 26,000 at the fourth.

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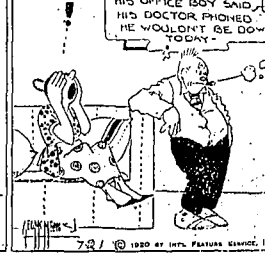
