INVASION FEARED

**RESOLUTE EVENS SCORE BY WINNING TODAY'S RACE WITH
SHAMROCK; PRETTY FINISH WINDS UP FASTEST CONTEST
OF SERIES; AMERICAN SLOOP LEADS NEARLY ALL THE WAY**

**Skipper Adams Displays Superior

DECIDING RACE TOMORROW

The fifth and deciding race will be sailed tomorrow, the officials announced, following today's contest. The Resolute beat the Shamrock boat for boat today while the Yankee boat was the slowest. The official time for the race was:

Resolute 1:25:25
Shamrock 1:25:30
The Resolute crossed the finish line three minutes and 41 seconds ahead of the Shamrock when the Resolute started two seconds ahead of the challenger also sailing the 20 mile course in three minutes and 16 seconds faster than the Lipton boat.

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ABOARD THE U. S. DESTROYER GOLDENHORN, July 23.—Resolute made it 50-50 today when she took the fourth race of the series for the America's Cup.

With the series standing two each the fifth and deciding race will probably be sailed tomorrow.

The Resolute finished at 1:25:21 (one-tenth of a second).

Today's race was the fastest of the series. Resolute led from the start to about four miles from the finish, when the Shamrock boat, up and past the American boat.

In a fighting finish Captain Adams of the Resolute set his big sloop and sweep past the challenger a half mile from the end.

ABOARD THE U. S. DESTROYER GOLDENHORN, July 23.—(UPI)—Resolute showed her heels to the challenger for America's yachting cup in the first two legs of today's race—the fourth of the series.

Shamrock IV was unable to pass the American boat on either of the two first legs after Skipper Adams had to give up the lead to the Yankee boat. Resolute's lead on Shamus' lead at the finish was about 10 minutes.

With a fresh squall making up ahead, Shamrock took in her top sail at 3:45.

A minute later Resolute took in her jib top sail and prepared to weather the squall.

At 3:48 Resolute was leading by a quarter of a mile. The finishing line at that time was four miles away.

The squall hit the yachts shortly after Resolute took in her top sail, but the wind ended fairly sharply. Shamrock set her jib top sail but did not send up her club topsail.

PARIS, July 23.—The funeral of William K. Vanderbilt, who died here last night, will be held in the American church in the Holy Trinity here at 10:30 A. M. Monday.

Arrangements were made to place the body in the mortuary chapel of the church until plans can be made to have it taken to United States.

Final interment will be in the Van derbilt mausoleum on Staten Island.

STREETS RUN BLOOD

Unionists and Sinn Feiners Engage in Struggles in Belfast and Several Are Killed or Wounded; Machine Gun Command Principal corners; Many Arrests Are Made; Troops Are Patrolling Streets.

Village Is Shelled.

GALWAY, Ireland, July 23 (UPI)—In reprisal for shooting of soldiers and constables, police and military today shelled the village (Galway) near here, burning the headquarters of Sinn Feiners.

BELFAST, July 23 (UPI)—Under fire restored here today, British troops continued patrolling the streets. Unofficial reports of the fighting received early this morning said that ten British soldiers were killed and between 200 and 300 wounded.

British forces were considerably superior to the Sinn Feiners today. Snipers stationed on a monastery roof near Belfast returned fire with "bitter and

murderous" accuracy, according to Harding's Talk Wine Approval

MARION, Ok., July 23.—Members of congratulations on Warren G. Harding's acceptance speech began to pour in by telephone and mail at headquarters here.

Party leaders heard from their wives in unanimous approval of Harding's speech on the campaign issue.

Harding's opposition to the League of Nations convention and the subject of the peace conference were particularly favorable to league with Sinn Feiners, joined him in a decision to prohibit here.

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GAS SHORTAGE TO RESULT IN DRASTIC PLAN

Rationing System for Entire United States Considered by Big Refiners

May Hold Price Down

Efforts Being Made to Keep Gasoline Over 40 Cents a Gallon

Washington, July 23 (UPI)—A gas shortage, resulting in a supply shortage throughout the entire United States, being considered by big refiners.

The rationing plan would result in gasoline being rationed to each motorist. It would mean that gasoline would be doled out to drivers under a quota fixed for each state.

California is now on gasoline rationing. Gasoline is now being sold from 31 to 40 cents a gallon. It is highest in New Mexico and northern New York.

Consumption is reported as 15,000,000 gallons a day.

With 15,000,000 gallons a day, there is a world record of 6,671 tons

of gasoline a day, it is evident that gasoline is in short supply.

Gasoline reserves are said to be approximately 100 million barrels.

Refiners are asked to limit production to 150 million barrels a month.

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Main Body of The Bolsheviks Near Germany's Border

Advance Guard Is Within 11 Miles of International Frontier and German Government Adopts Defensive Measures Along Entire Front; Military Circles Feel No Invasion to Be Attempted; Entente Troops Will Not Be Allowed to Cross German Territory.

BERLIN, July 22, (Night).—The main body of the Bolshevik northern army has reached a point 11 miles from the German border, while the advance guard is within 11 miles of German territory, according to the German news service.

The German government has adopted defensive measures along the entire front to prevent an invasion by the Bolsheviks, but it is believed that no invasion will be attempted. The chief reason is that the Bolsheviks have been driven into Germany by the Polish army.

Polish troops have advanced into Germany and are threatening to march on Berlin. The German government has ordered mobilization of all classes up to 30 years of age, according to a dispatch from Budapest.

REPORTS SAY POLISH CABINET RESIGNS

PARIS, July 23, (UPI).—The French foreign office today announced that the Polish cabinet had asked Moscow for an armistice and was sending a delegation to Moscow.

Deputized parties have stated the Polish cabinet had resigned and was replaced by a coalition of which the moderate Wilos was president and Dasmont, Socialist leader, was vice president.

FRENCH AND GERMANS CLASH

BERLIN, July 22, (Night).—French soldiers clashed with German civilians in front of the Kaiserhause hotel tonight. Shots were exchanged but no one was injured.

HUNGARY ORDERS MOBILIZATION

PARIS, July 23, (UPI).—The Hungarian government has ordered mobilization of all classes up to 30 years of age, according to a dispatch from Budapest.

REQUEST FOR ARMISTICE SENT

WARSAW, July 23, (UPI).—The Warsaw national council of defense this afternoon dispatched a delegation to Moscow to present a formal request for an immediate armistice.

AID TO POLAND ASSURED

PARIS, July 23, (UPI).—Prince Millerand, addressing the senate today, declared "we have decided to do both the possible and impossible to aid Poland."

U. S. AID BEING SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Informal representations have been made to the state department to learn if the United States government could be relied upon to aid Poland against the Russian Bolsheviks. It was learned today that these representations have been of a vague sort and could not be specific.

The state department will not reveal from whom the representations came.
