RESOLUTE EVENS SCORE BY WINNING TODAY'S RACE WITH SHAMROCK. PRE-EMPTIVE WINDS UP FASTEST CONTEST OF SERIES; AMERICAN SLOOP LEADS NEARLY ALL THE WAY Main Body of The Bolshevists Near Germany's Border

DECIDING RACE TOMORROW The fifth and deciding race will be sailed tomorrow, the regatta committee officially announced following today's contest. Resolute's lead on elapsed time at the first mark was one minute 30 seconds. Shamrock cut down the pole's lead slightly during the second 10 mile. The elapsed time being Shamrock 4:45:00.

POLISH COUNCIL OF DEFENSE WILL ASK FOR AN IMMEDIATE ARMISTICE

BERLIN, July 22 (Night)--The main body of the Bolshevik northern army has reached a point 31 miles from the German border, while the advance guard is within 11 miles of German territory, according to dispatches here. The German government has adopted defensive measures along the entire frontier to protect against a possible invasion by the red armies. In military circles it was not believed the soviet would attempt to invade Germany. Newspapers approved Foreign Minister Simon's statement that entente troops would not be allowed to cross Germany to reach Poland.

WARSAW, July 23 (UP)--The Polish council of national defense has decided to send a request to Moscow for an immediate armistice along the lines suggested by the allies, it was officially announced today. NEW YORK, July 23--Decline in quotation of German marks at \$255, 1/2 of 1921 today was attributed in financial circles to the rapid advance of the Bolshevik armies and the general uncertainty of central European conditions. The price for German exchange was the lowest figure touched in several weeks.

REPORTS SAY POLISH CABINET RESIGNS PARIS, July 23 (UP)--The French foreign office today announced Poland had asked Moscow for an armistice and was sending a delegate to Moscow. The negotiations were expected to take place at Gdansk. Dispatches here stated the Polish cabinet had resigned and was replaced by a coalition of which the moderate Witos was president and Daszynski, Socialist leader, was vice president.

REQUEST FOR ARMISTICE SENT WARSZAWA, July 23 (UP)--The Warsaw national council of defense this afternoon dispatched to Moscow and the soviet headquarters a formal request for an immediate armistice.

U. S. AID BEING SOUGHT WASHINGTON, July 23--Informal representations have been made to the state department to learn if the United States government could be relied upon to aid Poland against the Russian Bolsheviks. It was learned today. These representations have been of a vague sort and have carried no specific request, it was learned.

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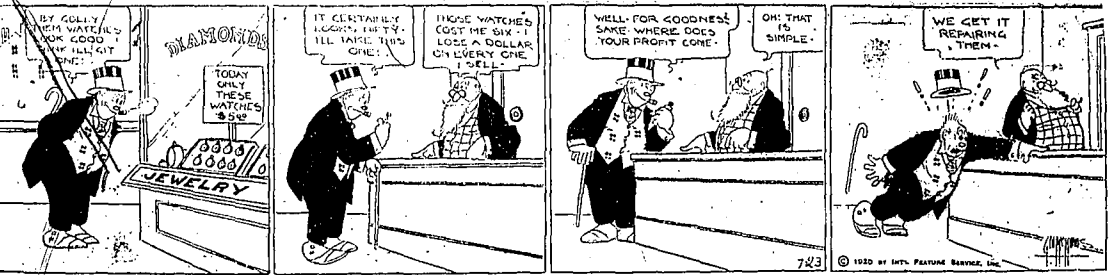

BRIEF NOTES OF SPORT INTEREST

There probably will be considerable difference of opinion as to the goal of the ball which will result from the effect of the football authorities of John Hopkins University of Baltimore to give their football coach a bonus of \$20,000 in the event that the Johns Hopkins eleven elect to wear the name of the season against Maryland State college last fall.

Those who are opposed to the bonus proposition in amateur athletics have their contention as follows: In the first place, it is unnecessary for the reason that college athletes always are doing their best in the interests of their Alma Mater, and no incentive is necessary to make them give the best that is in them.

Secondly, it tends to defeat the prime object of sport which is for the best physical results to be obtained, in that the coach, in order to make the extra money, is likely to divert his mind beyond the point where it is needed for them. The old spirit of "anything is good" is encouraged, and the athlete is not concerned with the physical goal to be obtained.

Thirdly, the coach, when he accepts the salary offered him for his services, automatically is expected to give his best efforts and as he cannot receive more than the best he can see the bonus is unneeded for.

These objections are not without weight and are worthy of the serious consideration of athletic authorities who may be inclined to follow the precedent established.
