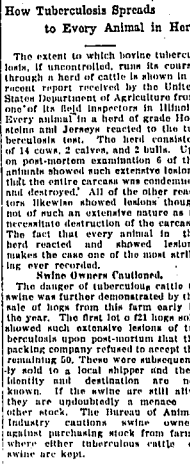

NEWSPAPER EDUCATION.

READ more newspapers and books, but have magazines alone if you want an educated public, advises Prof. William Lyon Phelps of Yale, according to The Fourth Estate.

There is a good deal of merit in this suggestion, although there are some very excellent magazines.

A few years ago a number of second and third-rate periodicals, in order to stimulate circulation, became devotees of sensationalism, and were dubbed by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt as "muckrakers."

The discriminating reader reads the news without any coloring, for he is capable of making his own conclusions concerning it.

The newspaper's opinion and comment upon the happenings of the times are found on its editorial page, and naturally follows that journals continually publish news and views of others with which they are not in accord, but on this account they do not suppress nor do they color such dispatches.

The good journal realizes its responsibility to the public of presenting to it just what happens, and this is almost a sacred trust, that exists between the newspapers and its readers.

Most editors would much prefer to tell only the pleasant and elevating things as the record of the day's history, but if they did this alone their journals would come to be real newspapers.

It is not for them to censor the news and decide for the public what it should read, but their main effort is to obtain a clear account of everything of interest that happens, whether it is good or bad.

The American public is the best-educated public in the world. Consequently it should be able to pass intelligent judgment upon anything that it reads in the daily press.

Professor Phelps is undoubtedly correct as to the educational advantage contained in reading most newspapers in preference to most magazines.

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo. July 26.—That original American, the Idaho, is going to be under to pay the board. Supported in royal idleness for many years by the government, the Idaho, once king of the Idaho, must now bow to the changing times and become a producer instead of remaining a mere ornament.
