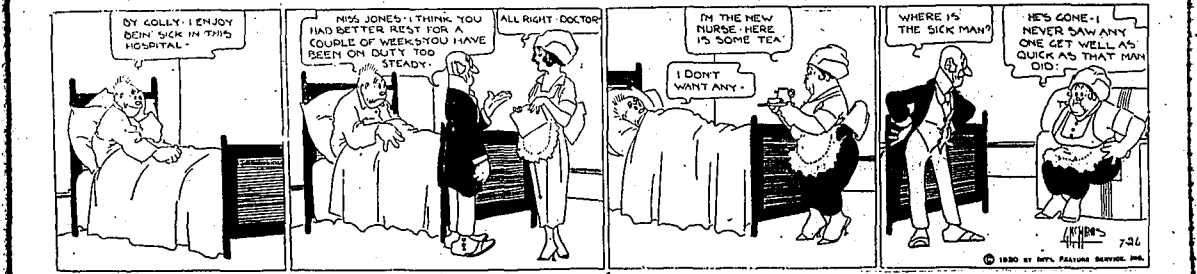

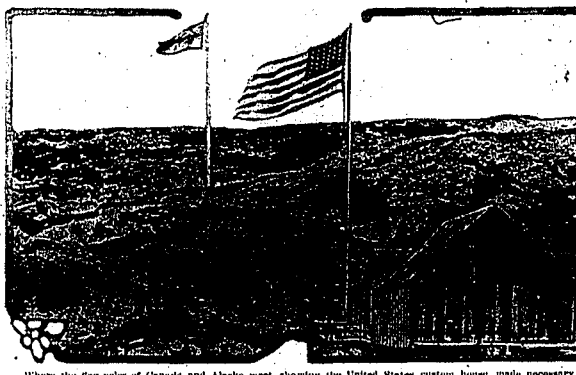

YELLOWSTONE WILD ANIMALS RESTOCK NATION'S BIG PARK

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., July 25.—Encouraging reports suggesting the increase in native American game have been received by officials of Yellowstone Park from many states and states to which breeders' animals from the famous park preserve were donated.

In an effort to repair the damage done by hunters, who have exterminated animals in the more thickly populated sections, it has been the policy of the National Park Service to send back to their native haunts deer, antelope and beaver to public parks and state preserves where they would be given favorable environment and a chance to multiply.
