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ARMISTICE DAY OFF

PARLEYS ARE OFF BETWEEN TWO NATIONS

Poles and Soviets Break and Former Delegates Are Returning to Warsaw; Chance That Meetings Will Be Resumed Later to Negotiate.

Russ Army Pressing in on Capital City Counter Offensive of Polish Troops Near Brody Is Reported to Have Collapsed

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Armistice negotiations between the Poles and the Bolsheviks have been broken off and the Reds are only 40 miles from Warsaw following the disastrous defeat of the Polish first and second armies, according to official Moscow wire, less and diplomatic dispatches received here today.

Bolsheviks through the Moscow press, sent out word that the armistice negotiations had been abruptly ended because the Polish delegates were authorized only to negotiate for a temporary truce, and that the Bolsheviks were to return to Warsaw and get power to agree on peace terms. The next meeting, the wireless said, would be Thursday at Minus, Merciless Peace Forbearance.

It is evident intention of the Bolsheviks to impose a mercantile peace on the field of battle. Officials here were inclined to doubt that the Warsaw government would give the delegates authority to return and negotiate for peace under such conditions.

While the Polish delegates were on their way back to Warsaw, the Bolsheviks delivered simultaneous smashes on the Lemberg and Warsaw fronts that have thrown both of these important cities into imminent peril. Before Warsaw the Reds crushed the first and fourth armies according to French foreign office dispatches, and pushed on to a point within 45 miles of the capital.

Advance Is Resumed On the Lemberg front the Polish counter-offensive collapsed after a sanguinary encounter and the Bolsheviks resumed their advance toward the Galician oil fields and the Galician capital.

PARIS, Aug. 3. (120 p. m.)—Armistice negotiations between the Poles and the Bolsheviks have been broken off and the Polish delegates are returning to Warsaw according to private office advices today.

The plane was one of the three aircraft piloted by John Garson of New York, which are making an aerial mail route from New York to San Francisco.

The other two planes had made a safe delivery but the third failed to gain enough momentum in clear the house. The machine was badly wrecked and the pilot was killed. None of the occupants was injured.

The other two planes came back to the starting field to learn about the accident, but later continued on their westward journey.

It was the first time that the premier in any public expression had definitely committed himself to recognition, narrowing down the conditions to a single concrete prerequisite.

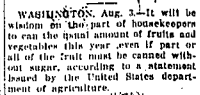

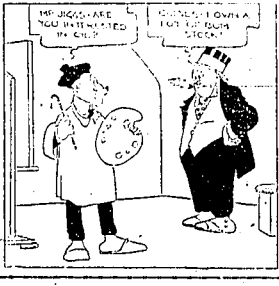

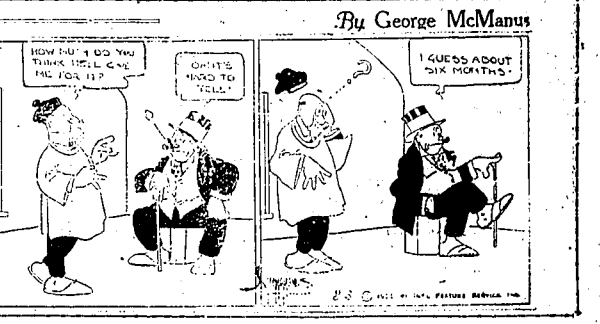
