FEDERAL JURY INDICTS MANY RAILROAD MEN

41 Bills Are Returned Against Members of Switchmen and United Engineers

Took Part in Strike Alleged Violation of Anti-trust Law and Lever Act Basis of Indictments

CHICAGO, Aug. 4 (AP).—The federal grand jury today returned indictments against 41 members of the Chicago switchmen's association and the United Engineers' association, for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law and the Lever act.

The identity of the respondents was not made public but was expected to be disclosed when the indictments were returned in open court, probably late today.

Railway Workers Included It was generally believed the indictment included the 27 railway workers who were arrested at the time of the strike but who have escaped prosecution so far.

Polish Armistice Delegates Return for Conference With Ministry Regarding Terms of the Bolsheviks for Discussion of Peace; Red Force Said to Be Operating in Attempt to Cut Warsaw Off.

RIVER BUG REPORTED CROSSED AND CITY OF LOMZA IS BEING SHELLED

PARIS, Aug. 4 (AP).—The evacuation of Warsaw is momentarily expected, according to addresses to the foreign office this afternoon.

The Polish armistice delegates have reached Warsaw and are in conference with the ministry on the demand of the Bolsheviks that they be empowered to discuss peace as well as armistice terms.

A large Red force was reported marching to size the Polish frontier in Hungary and the east, cutting Warsaw off from the Saldnu railroad over which all year interests are owned.

Another unconfirmed report was that Premier Lloyd George had sent a wireless message to Moscow, that the proposed London peace conference would be cancelled because of Russia's attitude in delaying the armistice.

In Armenia the Reds were said to have taken Chirchik.
