

Bolsheviks Resume Drive on Lemberg

Cox Acknowledges Peace Treaty as Leading Issue in the Forthcoming Political Campaign in Speech of Acceptance

Senator Harding's Proposals Are Denounced in Drastic Terms; Republicans Stand for "Separate Peace With Germany," He Declares; League Issue Is Sharply Drawn; Budget System Is Advocated for Handling Financial Affairs of the Nation.

By Herbert H. Walker. United Press Staff Correspondent. DAYTON, O., Aug. 7. Governor James M. Cox today formally accepted the democratic nomination for the presidency and sharply criticized the peace treaty as the leading issue of the forthcoming political war.

At a speech bristling with attacks, direct and sarcastic, he denounced Senator Harding's proposals for a "formal and effective peace as quickly as a republican congress can pass its declaration for a republican executive to sign." Cox declared "means but one thing—a separate peace with Germany."

EUROPE IN TURMOIL

WAR Schemes now to be taken as a matter of course in this world, so there is not so very much excitement in the country as news of the European situation. But, despite the apathy which is shown here, the war clouds in Europe are surcharged with more lightning than ever were those of 1914, and the security of the world is more threatened than at any time during the German successes in the early days of the world conflict.

It was said in these columns several days ago that the Polish situation is one that will have to be settled by force of arms with the allies taking sides, with the Poles, and at this day such seems to be the case, for England virtually has declared war on the Soviet government. This will force France into the conflict; Italy may be drawn in, and it is a problem which may very soon be facing Germany.

Russia is stronger today than she ever was before, and her leaders know it. Drunk with success, Russia is out for conquest. Her recent action with regard to the armistice proposals with Poland, indicates this attitude of mind. While a report of small events, from our despatch to the Philadelphia Public Ledger, summarizes the situation thus: "Peace with Poland, dictated by a triumphant, vindictive, and militant Bolshevism, will be merely a truce for Europe and the world. It will whet, not satiate, Moscow's lust to carry the Red revolution westward over land and sea. Until Lenin and Trotzky are shorn of military power, soviet civilization will sit enthroned on a powder-barrel. Bolshevism became a military menace because Polish aggression against Russian territory, and abroad by all allied Europe, called Russian patriots without 'Red' sympathies to the Bolshevik standards. Nationalist Russia must be torn from the side of Lenin and Trotzky by a solemn pledge that Russian territory is inviolate. Until such an assurance has been given Bolshevism will continue an embattled force, gathering, rather than losing, momentum while standing forth as the savior and guardian of the sacred soil of the Russian fatherland."

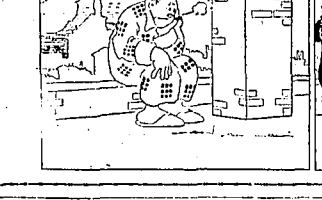

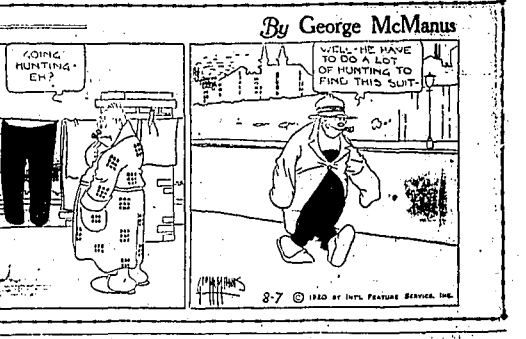

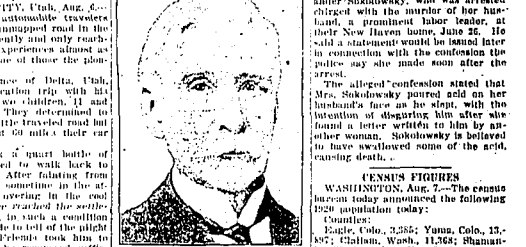
