WAGE ADVANCE ANNOUNCED ON RAIL EXPRESS

75,000 Employees Will Benefit Through Award Totalling About \$30,000,000 Effective on March 1 Labor Board Finds After Considering Evidence That Advance Justified

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10.—The federal labor board today announced a wage increase to 15,000 railway express employees, totaling approximately \$30,000,000. The award is effective as of March 1, 1920. The increase ranges from 2 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents an hour, the highest of that rate of 16 cents an hour. The employees had asked an increase of 5 1/2 to 8 1/2 cents an hour.

Every employee of the American Railway Express company, with the exception of executive officials, and the 25,000 employees employed by the express companies, including approximately 10,000 expressmen, will be affected by today's decision. The award is the second by the railway board, which was created by the Federal Commerce Commission, that has raised the wages of railway workers. Lightning Strikes Tent; 2 Are Killed

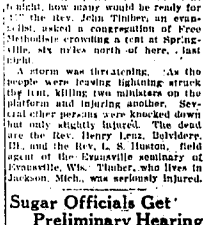
