Russian Forces Within 25 Miles of City

Basis for Peace Is Hoped for at Minsk Conference

SOVIET MAPS—OUT PLAN TO END THE WAR

British Cabinet Is Hopeful That Satisfactory Agreement Will be Reached; Lloyd George Refuses to Comment on Proposals of Bolshevik

Meetings Scheduled to be Resumed Today
Immediate Reduction of Polish Army Is One of Terms to be Insisted Upon

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Members of the British cabinet, it was learned today, believe there is a satisfactory basis of settlement in the armistice and peace terms which the Bolsheviks were to present to Poland at the Minsk conference today.

Immediate reduction of the Polish army to ten thousand men with an annual draft for the army of fifty thousand men hereafter. The line limit set on this demobilization is one month.

Granting to Russia all superficial troops. Repatriation of all shipments of troops or material into Poland from abroad.

Wants Access to Baltic. Handing over to Poland of additional territory in the eastern frontier to be given to the families of Poles killed in the war, as compensation.

Lloyd George refused to comment on these terms, as he said he did not wish to commit himself until after the Minsk conference, which was set for today.

Two attaches of the Russian mission in London, it was believed, had a message from Komaroff to Francis Lloyne, saying that the British terms be accepted by the soviet.

It was learned authoritatively that Lloyd George was a definite success secondary, and until terms before forming an opinion as to whether peace could be made at Minsk. It was feared the supplemental terms might be more severe.

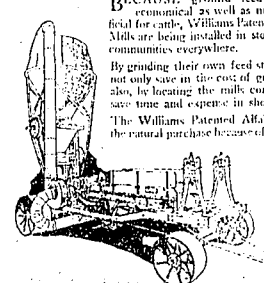

EINSTEIN "EXPLAINED"

THE Einstein theory of relativity would be utterly incomprehensible if we had no railroads. That, at least, is the inevitable conclusion to be drawn from reading all the explanations of it that have so far appeared. Having railroads, we may not only ride but we can also understand Einstein or at least say we do. It has been said that there are only 12 persons in the world who can grasp the theory in its entirety, one of which is Einstein himself. But with such a book as Edwin E. Shossou's "Easy Lessons in Einstein" available to the millions, there should be a few hundred thousand with better than a hazy idea of the most revolutionary doctrine promulgated since the Ben Davis or was it an early rascal descended on the head of Sir Isaac Newton.

But what have the railroads, already burdened with multiplied troubles of their own, to do with the abstract researches of a hardy "professor of physics," says Mr. Shossou.
"Suppose you wake up one morning, in a Pullman berth and look out of the window to see where you are. You find your view blurred by a passing train on the next track. Now if you do not feel any jar of your ear and cannot catch sight of the landscape beyond the other train you cannot tell whether it is your train that is moving forward and the other train is standing still, or if your train is standing still and the other train is moving backward, or if whether both trains are moving in opposite directions, or if whether both trains are moving in the same direction, but your train faster."

It is, perhaps, a momentous point to be confronted with before breakfast. The reader of Mr. Shossou's book, however, does not need to perform the experiment if he is all perked up for him in informal language and homely but apt metaphor. As Mr. Shossou informs to ward the last of his 124 pages, he legitimately grows more technical for the reason that this simple ground work has stated the problem so clearly that the reader is ready for him, and also for the reason that the Einstein theory really requires the combination of some gray matter for even partial comprehension.

Much more brief and compact is "The Einstein Theory of Relativity: A Course Statement" by Prof. H. A. Lorentz of the University of Leyden (Holland). This very compactness makes for less ready understanding of the problem, however, but as a brother physicist's exposition of Einstein's idea the smaller book is a satisfactory supplement to Mr. Shossou's presentation. Prof. Lorentz, too, relies on the example of the two moving trains.

Mr. Shossou's book contains Einstein's own statement of the case for relativity which appeared in the Times (London) last December. And Einstein himself refers to the compact example of the moving train.

The concluding paragraph of Einstein's statement holds good that the great physicist is not without a command of all human. "It is an application of the theory of relativity to the facts of readers," he writes, "today in Germany I am called a German man of science, and in England I am represented as a Swiss dev. If I come to be regarded as a hote nose, the descriptions will be reversed, and I shall become a Swiss dev. for the Germans and a German man of science for the English."

Was Hildre Bellou anticipating Einstein by a decade when he wrote, in the essay that concludes the volume called "First and Last": "The end of the world is the end of the world, and whether you are full of space or of time does not matter." Einstein should applaud that sentiment heartily.

For the benefit of the Chronicle we will say that the conventions at San Francisco and Chicago have been adjourned. And we might add that Mr. Harding is the republican and Mr. Cox the democratic nominees, respectively, for president. We also suggest as a matter of information that the League of nations is going to be the political war-gear of the democrats. Everybody will remember the league of nations, as it was Mr. Wilson's pet hobby. The Business Man

From Weekly Markets Bulletin. Regardless of what line he may be engaged in, no one is more vitally interested in the success of the farmer than the business man. The amount which the farmer receives for his product is the money which goes into the pockets of the business man. He finds his way to the local bank and there becomes the basic element of credit.

While outside interest is entitled to a reasonable profit and to equal rights with all other lines of activity it is nevertheless a fundamental principle that profits, whether reasonable or excessive, are taken out of the state of Idaho and deposited in the pockets of credit and prosperity of other localities. Instead of Idaho, where the money is produced, it should be produced for the purpose of all business interests in our state to stimulate the farmers' market and to give every attempt made on the part of outsiders to deprive this state of its resources beyond what is contributed to the state treasury. The farmers of Idaho had received \$25,000,000 a bushel for their 1919 crop and had the wheat man received one a pound for \$2.50 per bushel, the total of our state would not be showing maximum demand, and credits for the proper handling of the 1919 crop of wheat and corn have been ample to have met all reasonable demands.

As it is, the U. S. department of agriculture, by its cooperation with the University of Idaho extension division, has ascertained that the wheat man of Idaho had received \$25,000,000 a bushel for their 1919 crop and had the wheat man received one a pound for \$2.50 per bushel, the total of our state would not be showing maximum demand, and credits for the proper handling of the 1919 crop of wheat and corn have been ample to have met all reasonable demands.

The officers of the federal reserve bank, in our opinion, have made a grave mistake for the reason that from time immemorial wheat and wool have been the backbone of our civilization. The fact that wheat and wool are so important to the welfare of the federal reserve bank, it is true the business interests of our state are awakening to their own destiny.

From the standpoint of self preservation, every man who has a dollar invested in business in the state of Idaho should rally to the support of the present crop of wheat and wool. The federal reserve bank immediately come to his rescue. The farmers' bank account, by depositing the crop, will receive a large amount of interest. Farmers are entitled to improve their surroundings by building new homes, buying new equipment, and increasing their production and are entitled to reasonable profits for their activity. Under such conditions, business interests in the state of Idaho are entitled to such conditions business interests. From whatever angle the situation is now examined it must be concluded that the business interests and the business interests are identical. A knowledge that there are business men in the state of Idaho, it must be admitted, who are entitled to give aid and comfort to those who would steal our farms and range, can only be considered as a matter of judgment. It is in our opinion and distinctive in its effect.

The 1919 wheat crop of Idaho will probably aggregate 22,000,000 bushels. A loss to the producer of 50¢ per bushel on this amount will reduce Idaho's commercial operations to the amount of approximately \$11,000,000, the amount of which would go to the state treasury. The amount of which would go to the state treasury is \$15 to \$25 per thousand for lumber more than the commercial

value of this lumber, this money is likewise lost to the established business of the state. We would reiterate what we have frequently said before, that the farmers interest should be carefully guarded by the political, commercial and professional interests of our state.

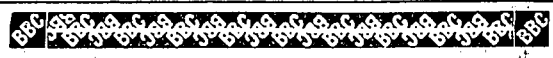

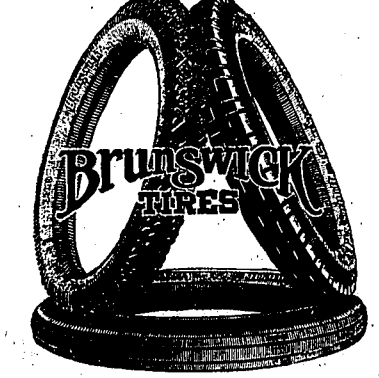

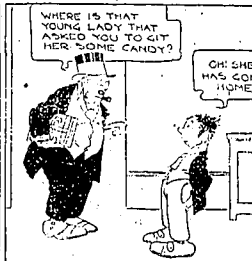
