Fighting Is Progressing Polish Troops Reported to Have Pushed Enemy Back 80 to 100 Miles From Warsaw

WARSAW, Aug. 20.—German citizens are cooperating with the Bolshevik everywhere in the invaded areas, particularly in Pomerania, the Polish official communiqué reported today. The Reds were said to be employing "terrorist" methods to subdue the anti-Bolshevik population in captured territory.

Polish troops have pushed the enemy back 80 to 100 miles from Warsaw.

American aviators operating with the Polish armies have been singled out for praise by President Pluadski. German flying Bolsheviks "German are cooperating with the Bolsheviks everywhere in the invaded area, particularly in Pomerania (north-west of Warsaw)," the statement said.

"Red troops are employing terrorist methods to subdue the civilian population of captured territory."

"Fighting is now progressing eight to fifteen miles northwest of Warsaw in the direction of Dabloski. Lemberg, Red-occupied."

"The Bolsheviks are close to Lemberg, which, however, is not in danger."

The commander in chief expressed gratitude to Major Cedric Belfrage and the third flying squadron (Americans) for their efficient work. This unit made off nights Monday, holding the Polish advance by continuous bombing.

RIOT IN JAIL CALLS POLICE

Prisoners on "Hunger Strike" Break Out of Cells and Overpower the Guards.

MALDEN, Mass., Aug. 20.—Seventy "hunger strikers" rioted in a dormitory of the penitentiary early today. The prisoners, who had been segregated because of their strike, turned the electric lights from their cells, and added by darkness early this morning a low broke out of their cells, released the riot and started a demonstration that lasted till daylight.

There were 15 guards in the building when the rioting began. Temporary Warden Brady had not determined whether any guards were injured.

City police who responded to a riot call fired some shots but were unable to get on the rioters, who broke windows, battered their cells and hurled buckets and bricks out the windows at the policemen surrounding the building.

Temporary Warden Brady summoned officers, who subdued the prisoners with streams of water. Interlocked gates closed the prisoners.

\$100,000 Is Loot of Men in Mail Robbery

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Mail sold by postal inspectors here to an amount of \$100,000 was taken from the "Hoffa-Costello" mail train at Chicago, Ill., today, by two auto bandits. Police said postal inspectors had in possession of the mail. The mail was supposed to have been delivered by large steel containers.

FIRE BURNING

SP. FALLS, Minn., Aug. 20.—At least 20 forest fires are burning throughout the state and international falls, according to reports from state foresters. The fires are being fought by fire rangers, who are trying to control spot fires that are spreading to valuable timber lands. Many more fires are burning in Minnesota, Idaho and Oregon, the wind.

Constitutional Right of Women to Vote Upheld

HARRISBURG, Pa., Aug. 20.—The constitutional right of the women of this state to vote at the general election to be held this coming November was upheld in an opinion by Attorney General Schaeffer today.

The opinion was made in reply to a request of Governor Spruiell to determine if there were constitutional limitations in the way of granting suffrage in Pennsylvania, upon ratification of the Anthony amendment by the 36th state.

International Court Proposed by Harding

MARION, Ohio, Aug. 20.—The work of organizing an international court now being carried on between the allied and associated nations with Elliott Wood, representing the United States, will figure in the campaign, Senator Warren G. Harding said. He did not make it what way but spoke favorably of Wood's work on the project saying he was working in close cooperation with the allied governments.

"I don't think that the details of what is being done over there are known here, but I can promise you that you will hear something about it later in the campaign," Harding said.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Polish reserves consolidated their victory before the end of the week, they would then have been returned when the Bolshevik reserves began to pour into the line.

Poland Warned Not to Extend Russian Drive

United States in Note Draws Attention to Danger of Aggressive Objective.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Poland has been warned by the United States not to repeat her advances into Russian territory if her army succeeds in driving the Bolsheviks from Polish territory. It was stated officially here today.

Unless this warning is heeded, Poland may prejudice her own case in the eyes of the United States, it was stated.

The attitude of this government is indicated in the note in Italy outlining the American attitude toward the Polish-Russian situation. This note, which declares for the "political independence and territorial integrity of Poland," concludes with a request that the allied and associated powers declare that the true boundaries of Russia be respected and "no transgression by Poland, Finland or any other power" be permitted.

Other warnings have also been given to the Poles by this government.

Session of League to Be in November

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—President Wilson has issued the call for the first meeting of the league of nations assembly. It was announced at the state department.

The date set for the meeting is November 15 and it is understood that Geneva will be the meeting place.

The call has been sent to Sir Eric Drummond, the league secretary, who must make the text public.

HANGED FOR MURDER

TURKEY, Miss., Aug. 20.—Charles Marshall was hanged in the jail here for the murder of four members of the "Hobbes Hill" gang at Moorhead, Miss., here last January. It was estimated that 5,000 persons witnessed the execution.

World Record Made in Pole Vault Event

ANTWERP, Aug. 20.—F. K. Fox of Chicago, after winning the pole vault at the Olympic games, established a new world record for that event in an exhibition jump. He attained a height of 18 feet 5 inches.

Fox broke his own world record of 12 feet 3 9/16 inches, which he established in Chicago, August 23, 1919, in a minor meet.

CLYBY IN ARRESTED

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 20.—Clyde Johnston, clerk of Police Judge Chamberlain's court, was jailed following his indictment in connection with the disappearance of \$10,000 from the court room.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 20.—Heads of the democratic party in Colorado have threatened a suit to enjoin Secretary of State Natta from placing on the list for the names of 41 candidates of the farmer-labor party. It was learned today.

The names were placed on the democratic ticket by petition at the primary and party leaders will insist that the candidates in question are not democrats and therefore not entitled to a place on the ballot.

The speaker, manager of the team, Steve O'Neill, Jack Graney and Joe Wood were selected from among Chapman's fellow players to act as pall bearers. The entire Cleveland ball club was due to arrive this morning for the funeral.

More than 200 floral pieces from Cleveland fans and friends of the team and others from all parts of the country blanketed the room containing the body. All of the major league teams were represented, while personal offerings were received from team owners, league heads and individual players.

Polish Armistice Delegates Are "Marking Time" While Army Is Pushing Forward

BETTER TERMS AWAITED

Trotsky Reported to Have Arrived in East Prussia to Meet German Officers.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Polish armistice delegates at Minsk are following out their plan of "marking time" while their armies continue to win further military victories. It was indicated in advices received here today.

While the proceedings at Minsk were shrouded in mystery, it was learned from official sources that the Poles are showing a disposition to hold out for far less rigorous terms than were at first proposed by the Bolsheviks. The best news regarding the negotiations was a lengthy message from the delegates by the Polish foreign office. Its contents were not made public.

Meantime, War Minister Trotsky has arrived at Proskien, in east Prussia (50 miles west of Grodno) to confer with German officers regarding political and strategic questions, according to a Danzig dispatch.
