## BOLSHEVIKI FOR TIFICATIONS DESTROYED BY GENERAL WRANGLER IN SOUTH RUSSIA

### OFFENSIVE BEING MADE BY ANTI-SOVIET CHIEF GAINING MUCH HEADWAY

United States Government Is Gathering Evidence Implicate German Plot to Frame Alliance With Soviet Russia; Armistice Delegates Hold Session but no Progress Is Made; Russian Delegates Charge Poles Purposely Dragging Out Negotiations to Gain Time.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Bolshevik fortifications in south Russia at the entrance of the Danube river have been destroyed by forces of General Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik leader, the state department was advised today.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—The United States government is gathering circumstantial evidence of an alliance or understanding between Germany and soviet Russia, it was learned today.

While Washington has no proof of such an alliance, additional reports indicating its existence have been received. It was stated officially, however, that the strictest secrecy is observed as to the nature of these reports.

The government is quickly conducting a searching investigation to determine whether an alliance between the two countries exists. It is probable that if there is found to be a Russo-German pact to the prejudice of Poland or the allies, the fact will be made public, as in the case of the famous Zimmerman note.

### 15,000 Captives Taken by Polish Army Up to Date

PARIS, Aug. 21.—The Poles had taken 15,000 bolshevik prisoners up to Tuesday, the French officer announced today. Yesterday they captured an additional 311 in occupying Olmany.

### ROBBERY SEEN AS INSIDE JOB

Police Find Evidence to Indicate That Thieves Had Information of \$100,000.

MOSCOW, Aug. 20.—(via wireless London).—Russian and Polish armistice commissioners held their second session yesterday. It was officially announced here today.

The Russians submitted their terms which were identical with those transmitted by the Russian side of the soviet representative protested that the Poles were purposely dragging out the negotiations.

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### Mexical's Gambling Places to Be Closed

MEXICALI, Cal., Aug. 21.—A very short lease of life is being enjoyed by Mexical's famous gambling resorts, which will close September 1, according to the orders of Governor Luis M. Salazar of Lower California.

Governor Salazar will not close the resorts in the State, he said today. He is, however, unalterably opposed to the gambling and vice concessions which have been given until September 1 to wind up their affairs.

Strict regulation of liquor traffic will be ordered, Salazar said. Saloons have been offered closed for a few days, but all soldiers of the Cantu army are mustered out.

## PROJECT FOR INTERNATIONAL PEACE IS BEING FRAMED BY HARDING AND G.O.P. LEADERS

MARION, Ohio, Aug. 21.—Behind the scenes, leaders of the republican party are framing in detail a new project for international peace, it was understood here today.

World prominent figures of European peace are said to be working with full cooperation on the plan. This scene elaborated in full will be handed out on the political stage at the psychological moment of the campaign, according to present plans.

Elliot Root, representing the United States abroad on the project, now is expected to return before long with outlines of the entire plan. It will be Harding's answer to the demagogic charges that he favors staying out of the league of nations.

To consider Europe, Harding and his advisers are in the main planning to take full advantage of the desire of American voters for some measure of international cooperation to lessen the danger of war.

The plan will continue vigorously to oppose entering the present league, as well as emphatically declare for organization of a new nation based on the plan they intend to present during the campaign. It is said here.

With announcement of this plan the argument will be made that European nations are not manifesting any interest in the present league and that it is dying of neglect. They will present the four plan as one having the approval of European statesmen as being a bona fide project and therefore one having a better chance of getting started.

Harvey to Meet Harding.  
Col. George Harvey, publicist, is expected here today to confer with Harding on this question.

Only vague suggestions are available here but it is said the full plan contemplates a judicial body rather than an administrative one as provided for in the present league covenant.

### ACTION AGAIN IS HELD OVER

House Unable to Muster Quorum at Nashville to Reconsider Ratification.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 21.—In the midst of a preliminary debate suffrage members of the lower house of the Tennessee legislature this afternoon voted against reconsideration of the proposition ratifying the suffrage amendment. Anti-suffrage members, contending no quorum was present and therefore it was impossible to transmit legislation, refused to attend.

After the vote the suffragists gave a "liberty bell" conference that they had won and that the fight was over.

The vote was taken amid scenes of confusion, anti-suffragists contending that the house was not legally in session at all.

By a viva voce vote the house then passed to adjourn until Monday.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 21.—When the lower house of the Tennessee legislature met today in business could be transacted because there was not a quorum present.

Suffrage advocates charged that anti-suffrage members had left to delay final action on a motion to reconsider ratification of the suffrage amendment. There were no members present, seven less than a quorum.

## ADDITIONAL TERMS TO POLES ARE SUBMITTED BY REDS

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Additional demands have been made upon Poland by Russia, according to the terms submitted Thursday at Moscow, and made public here by M. Kozlov, bolshevik trade commissioner. These demands, which (Moscow) had not been made public, included:

Creation of a Polish "red" militia, composed of workers, to be armed with the surplus munitions demanded from Poland by Russia. A list of this militia demand was circulated in the opening speech of M. Denishevsky, chief of the soviet ambassador, who pointed out that such a military body could be organized upon not to take an armistist the bolsheviks.

Poland shall not allow troops of any foreign state to enter or remain on Polish territory.

Poland shall return all rolling stock, cattle and other materials removed from Russian territory.

Reduction of the Polish army to 50,000 men and be supplemented to 100,000 men.

Cession of hostilities 72 hours after the terms are accepted, the Poles to retire 22 miles west of the front line and the international zone to be neutralized.

## OFFENSIVE OF POLAND BEING MADE

Nearly 10,000 Square Miles of Territory Recaptured From Bolsheviki During Last Few Days; Poles Still Driving Forward on Whole Line.

Fighting Is General Along Entire Front

Report From Moscow Indicates That Warsaw Still Threatened on Three Sides.

WARSAW, Aug. 21.—The Russian has been driven back from Warsaw at least on all points, an official communique reported today.

"General Rudnyi's Russian army has captured an attack to capture Lemberg and has advanced to within 15 miles of that city," the statement said.

"The progress of the south-eastward of Warsaw continues. There are now no Russians within 30 miles of the capital."

WARSAW, Aug. 20.—The Polish armies continuing their offensive have recaptured nearly 10,000 square miles of territory, the communique said. It was officially announced today.

"The Polish offensive in the direction of East Prussia is developing rapidly," the communique said.

"West of Warsaw and southeast of Warsaw, the Poles recaptured two thousand square miles of territory (including Lublin and Pultusk), advancing to the depth of 40 miles."

"East of Warsaw on the line of Novon-Minsk, Siedce and Biala, were captured more than seven thousand square miles, advancing fifty miles on a 125 mile front."

MOSCOW, Aug. 21.—(via wireless via London).—Fighting is progressing less than 20 miles from Warsaw, the Russian official communique said today.

The statement indicated the Polish capital was still threatened on the east, north and northwest.

"Fighting Reported in the vicinity of Ploensk (30 miles northwest of Warsaw) and Ciechanow (18 miles northeast of Ploensk)" the communique said.

"In the Warsaw region, fighting is going on west of Viatok (35 miles north and east of Warsaw) and Stanislav (20 miles east of Warsaw)."

"Fighting also is proceeding in the Great Lwow region along the western bank of the Bug."

The latter statement would seem to refute Polish and neutral reports of the recapture of Great-Lwow (the Poles).

Lindy said to him: "You are the only man I know of who has ever done this kind of thing." Fullerton says that he has never seen Lindy since.

"Later Luce said: 'I don't know if it is coming to me like a work.'"
