TOTAL DEFEAT OF RUSS ARMS NEAR AT HAND

Present Victory of Poles is Reported to be Complete Along Every Front. Take 90,000 Captives. In addition, 10,000 of the Enemy Forced to Be Interned in East Prussia.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The Russian defeat in Poland is complete and overwhelming that there is no possibility of the Bolsheviks turning their shattered armies into Polish territory, Press dispatches declared today.

90,000 Prisoners Taken. Bolsheviki prisoners taken to date total more than 90,000, according to official advice. Thirty thousand of these were taken from the Warsaw area and the remainder in the Danzig corridor.

Polish to Work Prisoners. According to unofficial information the Poles will utilize the field prisoners in rehabilitating the railways from Konigsberg to Berlin, where they are to be held.

The Polish general staff, in describing the Russian defeat before Warsaw, stated that 120,000 Russian troops, opposed by 180,000 Poles and that a third of the latter were taken prisoner. A correspondent of the London Post, relating details of the capture of Breslau, said that the Poles emphasized the superiority of the Polish artillery. He added that the Poles were extremely bitter against the Jewish battalions of the Polish army who remained in Breslau.

Outbreaks Against Jews. Serious outbreaks against the Jews in Warsaw were reported today. Profits of the Bolsheviki to strikers themselves from the capture of Warsaw territory, declared a disorderly retreat, unofficial advice reported. General Haller's army has cut the rail lines and by communication, forcing the Poles to abandon most of their artillery and transport. Polish cavalry detachments are constantly at the heels of the fleeing Russians and are capturing airplanes and other military equipment with machine gun fire. Four Bolsheviki divisions were said to have been completely destroyed in this area, through prisoners and casualties.

RUSSIANS IN NORTHERN ARMY ARE SEEKING FOR TERMS OF CAPTULATION

REPORT FROM VIENNA DECLARES REDS HAVE DECIDED TO GIVE UP

Dispatch Is Not Confirmed; Bolsheviki Are in Retreat Along Entire 500-Mile Front in Poland; Cavalry Are Withdrawing From Warsaw; Soviet Forces Are Completely Shattered and Are Facing Utter Destruction.

LONDON, Aug. 24 (3:30 p. m.).—The Russian northern army has opened negotiations for surrender, according to a report from Vienna today. The dispatch, which was unconfirmed, said the Bolsheviki had sent a messenger to General Sidoriski to arrange terms of capitulation.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The Bolsheviki are now retreating along the entire 500-mile battle front in Poland, according to unofficial dispatches from Warsaw this afternoon.

General Lindley, whose cavalry had threatened Lemberg for more than a week, has joined in the general Red withdrawal, it was said.

Only seven partially effective, Bolsheviki divisions remain within ethnographic Poland. Six other Bolsheviki divisions have been destroyed and eight others greatly shattered. The Russian debacle appears to be complete.

President Pilsudski's army has resumed its rapid progress northeast of Warsaw and is nearing the line of Ostroloka Lomza Bialostok.

Return to Warsaw. Polish troops have recaptured the Narew river south of Bialostok. Pomeranian troops have recaptured the Soltan (60 miles east of Grodno).

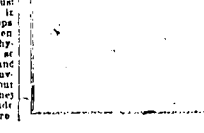

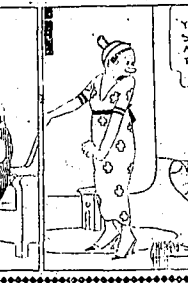
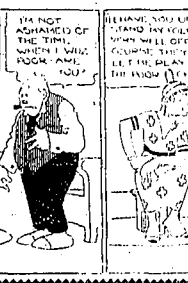
