TOTAL DEFEAT
OF RUSS ARMS
NEAR AT HAND

Present Victory of Poles Is Re-
ported to be Complete
Along Every Front.

Take 90,000 Captives

In addition, 10,000 of the Enemy
Forced to Be Interned in
East Prussia.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The Russian forces in Poland are so complete and overwhelming that there is no possibility of the Bolsheviks returning to their shattered armies on Polish soil. Major General, declared to-day.

The prediction was made that all Red forces will be driven from the occupied areas before the end of the week.

Major General Taken.

Bolshevik prisoners taken in total more than 90,000, according to unofficial sources. Sixty thousand are said to have taken in the Warsaw area, and the remainder in the Danzig corridor.

In addition to the great numbers of men taken, large quantities of material taken, the Poles have forced 10,000 Bolsheviks to take refuge in East Prussia, where they will be interned.

Poles to Work Prisoners.

According to unofficial information, the Poles are employing captured Bolsheviks in rehabilitating the railways from Königsberg to Berlin, where they cross Polish territory.

The following statement, describing the Russian defeat before Warsaw, asserted that 120,000 Poles were opposed to 180,000 Reds and a third of the latter were taken prisoner. A correspondent of the London Post, relating details of the capture of Warsaw-Litovsk on Friday, reported that the Poles had captured the Polish artillery. He added that the Poles were extremely bitter against the Bolsheviks, who had been the army who remained in West Prussia during the Russian occupation, they frustrated with the enemy.

Garrison Art. Feared.

Serious outbreaks against the Jewish soldiers were reported.

Prisoners of the Bolsheviks to sacrifice themselves from the trap north of Warsaw has resulted in a general retreat under the command of General Pilatowski. Armies reported. General Pilatowski's army has cut the last line of rail communication, forcing the Reds to fall back to Warsaw. RUSSIANS IN NORTHERN
ARMY ARE SEEKING FOR
TERMS OF CAPITULATIONREPORT FROM VIENNA
DECLARES REDS HAVE
DECIDED TO GIVE UP

Dispatch Is Not Confirmed; Bolsheviks Are in
Retreat Along Entire 500-Mile Front in Po-
land; Cavalry Are Withdrawing From War-
saw; Soviet Forces Are Completely Shattered
and Are Facing Utter Destruction.

LONDON, Aug. 24 (3:30 p. m.)—The Russian northern army has opened negotiations for surrender, according to a report from Vienna today. The dispatch, which was unconfirmed, said the Bolsheviks had sent a messenger to General Siderski to arrange terms of capitulation.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The Bolsheviks are now retreating along the entire 500-mile battle front in Poland, according to unofficial dispatches from Warsaw this afternoon.

General Budenny, whose cavalry had threatened Warsaw for more than a week, has joined in the general Red withdrawal, it was said.

Only seven partially effective Bolshevik divisions remain within ethnographic Poland. Six entire Bolshevik divisions have been destroyed and eight others greatly shattered. The Russian debacle appears to be complete.

President Pilatowski's army has confirmed its rapid progress northeast of Warsaw and is nearing the line of Ostrolensko-Lomza-Bielozostok.

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OBJECTIONABLE CLAUSES IN SOVIET
TERMS FOR AN ARMISTICE MUST BE
WITHDRAWN SAY ENGLAND AND ITALYCOX SAYS HE WILL PROVE HIS
CHARGES OF REPUBLICAN FUND

DAYTON, Ohio, Aug. 24.—Governor James M. Cox today declared that he would prove his charges that the Republicans are seeking a campaign fund of \$15,000,000 when he speaks at Pittsburgh next Thursday night.

In a sharp statement, Cox, referring to Senator Harding's denial of the campaign fund allegation, said he believed the republican candidate "was not telling the whole truth" in what he said about the things that are going on around him.

The governor then promised that at Pittsburgh he would "advise the country on the matter and let the senator claim to be ignorant."

It was understood that Cox plans to make the Pittsburgh speech his main point of attack on the Senate Committee which yesterday asked for all details of his charges.

Will Prove My Charges

His statement follows:

"Senator Harding denies my charge about the campaign fund which the senatorial oligarchy is seeking. I am prepared to prove that he is right, nothing about a lot of things that are going on around him. It reveals the dangerous symptoms which I have been pointing out for months.

This week I will advise the country as to matters which the senatorial oligarchy is trying to ignore and I will prove my charges.

SENATOR HARDING FOR PROTECTION.

MSENATOR HARDING believes in the protective tariff policy, and thinks that the nation will be calling for its "saving Americanism again." There is no doubt of it whatever. Before the next administration has reached its mid-point the absolute necessity for protection against a flood of incoming foreign goods, dumped on our market, will be so great that even a democratic administration, if in control, would be compelled to erect a tariff barrier of some kind. The billions that Europe owes us must be paid for in goods, and there is no economic problem that is going to require more delicate and skilled handling than that of protecting American industry while at the same time permitting payment of the foreign debt. The signs of the oncoming struggle are everywhere, and men who look ahead are frank in their solicitude of the outcome.

The Wilson-Cox covenant may be the "hope of the world," but Harding and Coolidge are the "hope of America."

Again we say, "You can't get a new deal by electing Cox." He has already swallowed his own words on the League of Nations to please Wilson. He hears his master's voice.

APRON AND FROCK

Designs Effectively Carried Out in English Prints.

When Whole Orange Fuchs Is Used the Ends Are Tucked Under the Band.

Any number of pretty dresses frocks have been designed, the strings of which form a sash. Some of these fuchs are used as aprons. Such designs are most effective, especially in fresh colors, when prints of small design. The aprons are not at all like the plain skirts which have come to be known as aprons. They are aprons, just like mufflers, with the fuchs tucked under the band.

When a white orange fuchs is used the ends are tucked under the sash band. Sometimes, when the sash is too long, the fuchs crosses at the middle and is used to form a sash in the back.

A shade of blue chintz known as blue banded blue and white is somewhat darker than French blue, and is excellent for aprons. It is a country color.

With some white chintz and checkered head to be used as trimmings, very pretty designs may be easily worked out. The idea of making such a frock is to cut it with a long sash portion having loose like a skirt, and attach it to a straight little skirt. A loose panel gathered with a heading may be joined at either side of the sash portion, and the sash portion with the checkered head and the fresh sash with white hem. These blue chintz dresses may be very pretty made with frilled white orange aprons.
