CENTRAL-BLOWS STRUCK BY REDS

Police in Battle With Holdup Men

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (UP).—Police and two holdup men fought a running gun battle in the business district here today when the latter attempted to hold up the Illinois Postoffice Society. About twenty shots were fired. One holdup man was slain shortly after 9 p. m., when thousands were working at their work.

Paul Korvack, owner of the Illinois Postoffice Society, said jewelry worth more than \$100,000 was being placed in a show case when the holdup entered. When they ordered him to put up his hands, Korvack began to shout. The shots went through windows and into adjoining buildings. Police joined in the fight. Several hundred persons stood on the street curiously watching the battle.

NORTHERN ARMY ANNOUNCES BIG RECESSION ATTEMPT TO GET ITS WAY THROUGH PARLIAMENTS

SOME SUCCESS IS REPORTED UNOFFICIALLY; ATTACKS ARE BEING MADE WITH GREAT FURY; ENEMY IS COMPLETELY SURROUNDED, ACCORDING TO OFFICIAL COMMUNIQUE ISSUED FROM WARSAW.

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—The Russian northern army has begun a counter-offensive with some success, it was reported in unqualified dispatches received today.

A decisive battle was in progress yesterday in the neighborhood of Vlodzysk (on the Polish railway station frontier, 25 miles south of Altonien).

Entertainment Fund of \$97,500 Said to Be Turned Over to the Democrats.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—England is ready to pay real money to all the election of a democratic president, Congressman Frank Hoffman, Illinois, charged in a statement received here today.

Hoffman's statement, issued through the republican national headquarters here, said the British parliament recently voted the British ambassador in Washington an "entertainment fund" of \$97,500. "This fund already has been turned over to the democratic committee," Hoffman said, "where it will be distributed to the best use of the money."

"No member of the campaign in the United States is permitted to receive any money from the fund," Hoffman said, "but it will be strictly non-partisan."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The anti-suffrage fight against the nineteenth amendment was transferred to Washington today when a suit to enjoin Secretary of State Cully from preparing the amendment was filed in the District of Columbia supreme court.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UP).—Suffragists today expected Secretary of State Cully to provision the ratification of the 19th amendment.

"According to suffrage leaders here the Cully suit was intended to delay ratification as long as possible," they said.

"This certificate will be the formal notification that the thirty-sixth state has ratified the amendment. It is in the mails."

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NO SURRENDER OF NATIONALITY SAYS HARDING WITH RETURN TO REPUBLICAN CONTROL; PARTY TO EVER KEEP FAITH

MADISON, Ohio, Aug. 25.—The United States would rather cultivate opportunities to the friendly soil of the West than to a phantom republic which would exclude and expatriate of the old "Senator Warren G. Harding" who today in his speech before the crowd from porch to members of the Wisconsin county, Ohio, declaration.

"Nobody has a thought of American citizenship in the world but our shores in our 'national partnership'—the American continent and with the Pan-American countries, Harding declared.

"I require no demagoguing, no promises these actual best interests and friendships in the frank spirit of continuous cooperation, Harding said.

NO Surrender of Nationality.

"Let me assure you of one thing: In my nation's return to republican control will be our outstanding achievement—the will, no surrender of living nationality for peace."

Mr. Harding reviewed the war record of the republican party when it was in the majority in congress, "as the party kept faith, and it is a fact that it will continue to do so in the days of peace."

Many Women Present.

Harding took a special notice of the large proportion of women in today's delegation, declaring it was significant and "heroic" that they attended.

"That it not been for the republican congress, it is not to be expected that the women would be in the detail of over one million, four hundred million dollars in total of our nation's income, one hundred million dollars, Harding said.

COX LINES UP ALLEGED DATA FOR BIG TALK

LUCERNE, Switzerland, Aug. 25.—The hunger strikers in the Swiss canton of Lucerne may starve if they refuse to eat, Premier Lloyd George declared today in a telegram to Macdonell.

"I regret to hear of the pain inflicted on you by your hunger strike," he said, "but it is impossible for the government to make an exception in your case," the message said.

Extravagance Is on the Wane With a Feeling of Caution in Business Due to Assurances That Low Prices Near

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—Extravagance in the working class as on the wane and a feeling of caution in business transactions because it is felt that drop in prices is inevitable, according to the monthly statement of the federal reserve bank here today.

The buying public, the statement said, is checking the extravagances which have made "bonanza" hitlers for industries and trade catering to popular demand and needs, regardless of prices, it said.

"Caution rises in business in the very midst of the statement said. 'The producers are cautious for the good reason that mistakes cannot be made in high priced labor and raw materials' without loss both of prestige and profit. Middlemen are cautious because the retailers compel them to be. And retailers are taking frequent soundings, because they have sensed that in the popular purchasing power."

The key to the entire situation, it declared, is a "death of dollar capital and restriction of bank credit."

"This restriction" resulted in a shifting of burden and responsibility, it said. Sales dropped and goods piled up in warehouses. Those who were sold at a loss eventually, it was predicted.

The labor situation was explained, though there is still some shortage, the statement declared. The housing crisis continues acute.

Poland's Nationality

HALT IN RUSH AGAINST RUSS

Armies Must Follow Up Advantages Gained and May Have to Cross Frontier, According to Military Authorities; United States Opposes Such a Move.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 25.—Poland's armies cannot halt their retreat from the Bolsheviks at the eastern frontier of the United States, according to belief expressed in official Polish circles today.

At the same time it was indicated at the state department that any further advance of the Polish army beyond that boundary as set by the peace treaty may produce heretofore of obtaining the return of the Polish crown Prince Louis, but minister here has formally requested from the government.

While it was emphasized there was no attempt to forecast the attitude toward Warsaw, it was stated in official Polish quarters that it would be "strategically impossible for Poland's armies to halt their advance beyond that boundary as set by the peace treaty."

An earnest effort was made by the leaders to have all women register. They resorted to old time campaign methods, using floats, music and car rallies.

Many Illinois cities, operating under the same registration law, expected the first heavy registration of the new voters today.

Borah's Attitude on League Is Endorsed

POCATTELLO, Idaho, Aug. 25.—Strong endorsement of Senator Borah's attitude on the League of Nations was made by the republicans here today in a public meeting held last night in the adoption of the platform. Nominations are expected to be held here today.

A concerted fight was launched last night to prevent Governor Borah's nomination for the United States Senate. Governor Davis undoubtedly will be re-nominated for his present office.

HIGHER RATES BEGIN TONIGHT

Freight and Passenger Charges Are Effective at Midnight Throughout Nation.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Higher freight and passenger rates will take effect at midnight tonight.

However, until Jan. 1, 1921, the rate on coal will be in effect.

It was estimated that the new rail-freight rates will cost the nation \$4,000,000 per day, and will be reflected in the prices of commodities.

The new passenger rates which are an increase of 25 per cent, will bring to the railroads about \$100,000,000 per month, and will be paid directly to at least by the more than 100,000,000 persons who travel on the roads each month, according to latest figures available at the I. C. T.

Bandit Must Deliver American Prisoners
