

Food Prices Declining in All Sections; Drop of 25 Percent Comes in 4 Weeks

Nothing Can Stop Drop Until Normal Level Is Reached, declare Chicago Grocers; Return of All Commodities to Reasonable Basis is Foreseen by Former President of Chicago Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1 (UP)—Return of all commodities to normal prices is indicated in the record crops throughout the United States, Joseph P. Griffin, former president of the Chicago board of trade, declared in a statement today.

Griffin praised the grain exchanges as important factors in bringing the uncertain period of adjustment. Food prices have declined 25 per cent in the last four weeks, while other grocers declined.

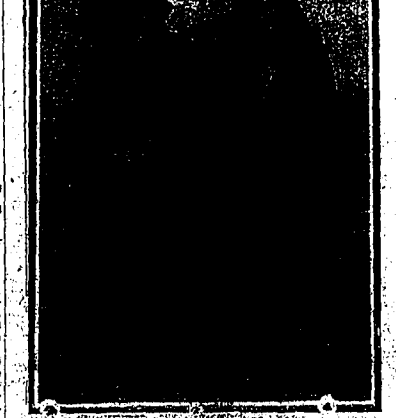

A WOMAN'S MESSAGE.

MRS. CORINNE ROOSEVELT ROBINSON, a widow of Col. Theodore Roosevelt, has sent telegraphic greetings to western progressive women and to young women voters from Chicago, just prior to beginning a speaking tour in the Middle West. Mrs. Robinson, who seconded the nomination of Leonard Wood at the Chicago convention, is to come as far west as Omaha before joining the delegation of women in Chicago on October 2 en route to the home of Senator Harding at Marion.

Mrs. Robinson's message read: To Mrs. J. B. Hume at western republican headquarters:—

"The special reason which caused me to take this trip to the Middle West is to impress upon former members of the progressive party that I am absolutely convinced that the colored world must get to be behind the republican nominee (as he did in 1916) and put to an end what he considered the most sinister influence that ever enmeshed in its clutches the people of the United States, namely, the influence of the democratic party during the last seven years.

"By the most frequent use of the name of Theodore Roosevelt the democratic nominees are trying to confuse the minds of former progressives.

"The greatest asset to politics is suffrage for women. It is sincerely conscientiousness and order. The danger in connection with women in politics is a certain kind of sentimentality which only excites my public indignation thus far I have found that my auditors are more interested in the Wilson league of nations. The people are beginning to realize that without Americanization pervasiveness the Wilson league would be a detriment not only to America but to the whole world. I think that really studious women have already come to the conclusion that 'America First' is not the selfish slogan which they originally seemed to feel it was, but it is a promise to the whole world that by cleaning our own house thoroughly we can most effectively help clean houses in other nations of the world. I find people are against Wilsonism and against Article 10. Although I have always given my auditors an opportunity to ask questions, I have had no one to ask me about the Wilson league of nations further than I explain in my address. They have their minds made up."

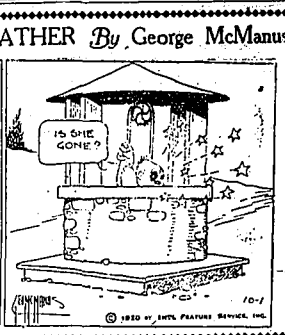
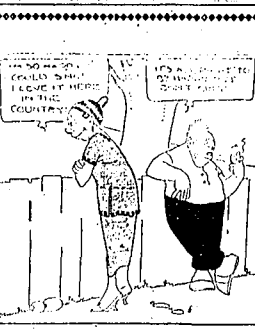
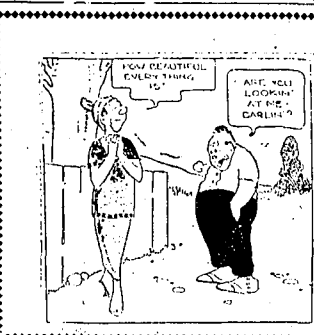

CUSTOMS OF GUAM: FETTERED IN POUND GAIN

Island's Inhabitants Retain Primitive Manners.
Happy and Careless, Yet With a Sense of Industry and Thrift—The Factors of the Island, as Activated by the Family.

The increasing commercial importance of Guam is reflected in a recent visit of the postmaster of Guam, principal city of one smallest possessions of the United States, to the island. The postmaster's visit was for the purpose of delivering his postal notes for the island.

Curious customs and natural resources of Guam are described in a National Geographic society bulletin as follows:

"The fruit of the common tree (Ficus) is used for the making of a sticky fish. The fruit is pounded into a paste, mixed in a bag, and kept over night. The time of an evening low tide is selected, and bags of the pounded fruit are taken out on the reef flat, where the fish are scattered in the reef. The fish soon appear on the surface, some of them being, others attempting to swim, and finally straggling along the side of the reef. The natives sweep them in their hands, saving even the scales for food.

In the mangrove swamps when the tide is low, hundreds of little fishes with protruding eyes may be seen basking about in the mud and other things among the roots of the Rhizophora and Scaevola. These belong to a group of fishes known as the 'mud fish' and their bodies are covered with a mucous coating. The mud fish are used for food by the natives.
