Commission to Control Leagues  
Being Considered by Owners of Teams Today.

## Comiskey Likes Plan

McGraw and Others Also Approve Proposal as Safeguard Against "Crookedness."

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (UPI)—A regularization of baseball, with a commission composed of men of the type of General Pershing, Judge Taft and Judge Landis in supreme control, was being considered today by owners of major league baseball teams.

The plan was suggested by Charles A. Comiskey, owner of the White Sox; John J. McGraw, part-owner of the New York Giants; William Veeck, president of the Chicago Cubs; Barney Dreyfus, owner of the Pittsburgh Pirates, and John A. Heydler, president of the National League. Bancroft Johnson, president of the American League, said he had not been consulted.

## Will Consider Plan

Those backing the regularization idea planned to put it before the base ball commissioners at their meeting this year in Cleveland in baseball resulting in indictments being voted out by the Cook county grand jury last week.

An official announcement of the new plan was expected to be made at a meeting in November in Indianapolis City when league members gather.

Under the proposed plan the commission would attempt to arrange a working agreement between minor and major league teams.

Members of the commission would be paid the highest salaries of anyone in baseball. Their salaries would be provided for in dividing the world series money. Their decisions would be reviewable.

In selecting commission members, it would be secured men with no financial connections with the game or of character above possible suspicion.

## Grand Jury Takes Recession

While the plan of reorganization was being considered today, the grand jury sat recessed, adjourning its session until next Monday, when it will be made a special session.

Gambling in the National League will be investigated next week. George's Attorney Macay Hoyne has returned from New York with additional evidence, and he expects to file charges in indictments against three players not members of the White Sox team, and a number of gamblers.

Thomas T. Nash, attorney, announced today he had been retained by Buck Weaver, player of the Federal League, and Harry Felsch, pitcher, in those cases if indictment voted by the grand jury are returned.

Nash said the four players desired receiving any money in connection with thrown games in the 1919 world series and he would demand an early trial for them.

## M'Swiney Recovers Following Collapse

LONDON, Oct. 2 (UPI)—Following a sudden collapse last night, Lord May or MacSwiney recovered early today and slept several hours according to a bulletin issued shortly before noon.

This was the first day of his hunger strike.

## MORE DRASTIC MEASURES ARE TAKEN TO KEEP JAPANESE OUT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (UPI)—Steps have been taken that the "gentlemen's agreement" by the state department to "limit" is not entirely satisfactory. Under this agreement, Japan voluntarily undertakes to stop immigration to the United States against Japanese immigrants.

That was authoritatively learned today.

This new development in the negotiations over Ambassador Shidemaru's protests against the proposed California law for absolute prohibition of land by Japanese was reported as having taken place in Washington.

Island S. Morris, American ambassador to Japan, has brought up the negotiations with Shidemaru for a study of the "gentlemen's agreement" for the purpose of deviating some measure for an outright exclusion of Japanese immigration. Morris is continuing the negotiations for the United States.

While no plan is known to have been agreed upon, it is understood that the state department has taken the position.

## Nation-Wide Strike of English Miners Referred to Unions

Proposal to Walk Out Is Postponed Until October 16 to Allow Vote to Be Taken; Referendum Will Come October 11 and 12; Miners in Wales, However, Have Gone on Strike.

LONDON, Oct. 2 (UPI)—The question of a nation-wide strike will again be referred to a direct vote of the coal miners.

The strike, originally voted for September 25, was postponed until today. At the meeting, miners' leaders, who were decided to put off the strike until October 15, to permit a national ballot on the latest compromise offer of the owners.

The referendum will be held October 16, and on October 14 the miners' delegates will meet again to take up the results of the vote.

Mountaineers 2,000 miners in Wales, objecting to the "autonomy" of the nationalists, have gone on strike.

Later 8,000 additional miners went out for the same reason.

## LEAGUE'S FOES ARE SUMMED UP

Governor Cox Declares That Profiteers of Both War and Peace Oppose Plan.

JOPLIN, Mo., Oct. 2 (UPI)—Profiteers of both war and peace are opposing the league of nations. Governor Cox charged yesterday that the nationalists are "the enemies of today."

"As you will find the munitions profiteer is opposed to the league because it provides for disarmament, making future wars impossible," so will they that profiteer of peace oppose the league, the governor asserted, which means this from a representative of humanity in sweat shops and involuntary factories," he said.

"Not only is this league covenant already functioning as the nearest approximation to a guarantee against war, but it is also the guarantee of the continuance of world progress, and the means for humanitarian advancement," he continued. "For example, article 28 in the world covenant of humanity in the league."

## ENGLISH BEING URGED TO TAKE THE FACTORIES

Speeches Made to Unemployed to Carry Out Same Plan as Did the Italians.

LONDON, Oct. 2 (UPI)—The Evening News reported today that a mob of unemployed outside the factories in Coventry singing "The Red Flag" to urge the English workers to go to work to save the industries in the same manner as the Italian metal workers.

According to the newspaper's press corps, envoys entered the Armstrong and Siddeley munitions works and held mass meetings, but were dispersed before arrival of police reserves.

**Navy Examination For Commissions**

The navy department announced on Sept. 22 that competitive examination of temporary and reserve officers, active or inactive, for appointment to the corps of engineers, to the navy, or to the marine corps, will be held in the navy yard, to be held in October. All officers who served in the world war are eligible to take the examination providing their age does not exceed 35 years, plus their actual service in the navy or in the successful candidates. It is proposed to build up, so far as possible, the permanent commissioned strength of the navy, which is much below its authorized strength at the present. The navy department has been unable to recruit in some former reserve commissioning officers who have signified their desire to enter the regular service. Reserve officers again are urgently requested to forward their addresses with the least possible delay, in order that the late changes of address may be properly filed in the navy department.

Cleveland Superior to Brooklyn  
According to Analysis of Sports Writer.

NEW YORK.—Cleveland has proved a poor place to sell "Buck" stories.

Try to tell any of the Fins you fans that the plucky Chicago catcher is the best backstop in baseball and you'd be as popular as one of the "white shirts."

It is generally conceded, however, that Schulte and O'Nell are the best catchers in baseball.

The position behind the plate is of the greatest importance in a world where, in practically all of the ball clubs, a man's ability to catch the ball has been a big factor in the victory—Hank Gowdy, for instance, is 114, and others, including Kling, Brownshard, Schmitt, Carrigan and Schulte.

The National League Cleveland, Chicago and Cincinnati, Cleveland has won over Boston, the National League champions who are behind the bat than the ordinary pennant winners team.

Krueger and Miller, who do the bulk of the work for Updegraff, are fully up to the job, though they are compared with the most O'Neill.

The chunky Irishman has had one of the greatest seasons of his career this year. He is hitting around .325. He is deadly shot to the bases and a whiz at blocking the plate and a whiz at getting on base.

Krueger and Miller are only half-batters—the former .289 and the latter .325. N'Neill can approach the class of O'Neill in throwing or hand play.

In respect the Indians have Stumpo and Chet Thomas, two veterans who have been all around the circuit and have seen their best days.
