JAPAN SOUGHT TO GET CABLE IN OWN HANDS

Proposal Made to United States For Cooperation Is Flatly Rejected.

Matter Is One-Sided Foreign Control Is Frowned Upon by the American State Department.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Efforts by Japan to control a cable across the Pacific ocean between the United States and Japan came to light here today.

A proposal was made some time ago with the approval of the United States government that the United States and Japan cooperate in building a cable across the Pacific.

The building of the cables was proposed to the state department by an emissary of Japanese capitalists.

The state department pointed out that the Japanese government forbids the landing of any foreign cable on Japanese shores, and replied that the American government could not allow the landing of the proposed cable on American soil if it were controlled by foreign interests.

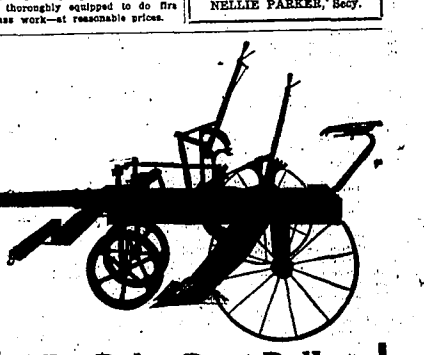

WHY LITHUANIA AND POLAND ARE FIGHTING.

The reannexation between Lithuania and Poland have become more acute, subdued and again becomes sharp in the past week. In the confusion of claims these things may be taken for granted: However the struggle started, the Poles had no intention of a great invasion of Lithuania, and steps taken toward Lithuanian territory were in the nature of a feint. The country, having made peace with the soviet and being inclined to stick to the soviet frontiers was prejudiced against Poland, and Poland tried to overcome the threatened hostility by a show of force. The repulsion of this move by the Lithuanians indicated to Poland that other methods must be used.

The operation of frontier is important, but not nearly so important as joining Lithuania to Poland by political treaty, extending the frontiers of Poland among the Slavic peoples. The Poles may appear to the league of nations, conveniently meeting in Paris, but at Lithuania is not a signatory member of the league the award might prove ineffective and French opinion will probably persuade the Poles to deal directly with Lithuania at a conference already arranged.

D'OLIER AT CENTRALIA.

The national commander of the American Legion has paid homage at the graves of the four victims of the Armistice day murders at Centralia. As scars of other incidents at Legion history have warned, the address of Commander D'Olier at this shrine of the American Legion served notice that the organized war veterans will stand to the last as a wall of steel against all advocates of violence, whether they dub themselves "Wobblies" or "Parlor Bolsheviks," says the Pacific Legion Magazine.

"There was nothing of valor in D'Olier's reference to the men who killed the peaceful paraders," wrote James E. Darnst, associate editor of the American Legion Weekly, who accompanied D'Olier on his tour of the West. "The 'Wobbly' orator, of typical eloquence, would have been disgusted at the restraint with which the Legion leader referred to the enemies of his organization and the enemies of his organization's country."

But there was the menace of gloved steel in the note of warning sounded by D'Olier. He wasted no words in idle mountings, spouting venom at the I. W. W., but he voiced the determination in the soul of every Legionnaire to see that Warren O. Grimm, Arthur McElfresh, Dale Hubbard and Ben Casaraghi shall not have died in vain.

"I come here as to the shrine of the American Legion, followed by our first martyrs, because Centralia will mean to the Legion what Dunker Hill, Gettysburg and Waterloo Thierry mean to our nation," said the heart of every Legionnaire.

SHOCKER FOR GRAIN FIELDS

SAVES MUCH FARM LABOR
Actuated by the growing dearth of field labor in the great wheat region of Western Canada, a farmer in that district has designed a machine which, attached to a binder, automatically forms and deposits complete shocks of grain in the field, says an illustrated article in Popular Mechanics Magazine for September. Shaves from the binder pass up a conveyor into a hopper, and then, level down, into a vertical bucket with spring arms that adjust themselves to the size of the shock.

FRANK LIGHTNING BOLT

BUTCHERS' BLOOD OF SHEEP
A Jarring crash of lightning interrupted the rest of two herdsmen recently as they kept near their flock of 1,250 sheep on the range about the American Fork canon, in north central Utah. A hurried walk for September 24, the electric bolt struck the shepherd, declares Popular Mechanics Magazine in an illustrated article for September. The lightning had cut two wide swaths, about 250 sheep in each between these swaths and on either side, the animals were not touched.

SHARE NIKKEN ON AUTO WHEEL

ARE ANTI-SKID ATTACHMENT
A new anti-skid attachment for automobile tracks is intended for use on frozen and inclined surfaces, and is set forth according to an illustrated article in the September Popular Mechanics Magazine. An clamp to the outside of each wheel, the attachment consists of two concentric rings of steel, the outer of a little more than the diameter of the wheel rim. Piercing these rings radially are 18 heavy pointed spikes or prongs, which by the weight of the track are forced into the highway.

HELICOPTER OF GREAT SIZE

BUILT BY A FRENCHEMAN
Stimulated by the offers of large money prizes, a number of French aeronautical engineers are busy with the construction of vertically rising, heavier-than-air machines. The first of these is a helicopter characterized by its unusually large size and substantial construction, which is the subject of an illustrated article in Popular Mechanics Magazine for September. The wings resemble in plan the leaves of a four-leaf clover, and are carried on metal tubes which radiate from a central upright. This upright is mounted on the middle of the metal fuselage, and is revolved by a nine-cylinder radial engine.

ANGLES NIKKEN IN MOVIES

USE TINTED RUBBER FISH
Movie sportsmen who stalk into the picture carrying the rods and strings of trout, apparently so freshly caught that their tails still wiggle, are not necessarily lucky fishermen, declares Popular Mechanics Magazine in an article in the September issue. Until recently, film directors who needed angling scenes in their pictures were dependent upon the notoriously unreliable means of living fish. But modern efficiency demands a method more certain and less wasteful of time. A California picture concern therefore engaged a manufacturer of rubber to produce a series of accurately fashioned rubber trout, and an artist combed the veridicalitude by tinting the elastic fish, with oils, in nature's colors.

Coffey, states his candidacy cost him \$34,444 of which is represented by the loss of two whiskey prescriptions.

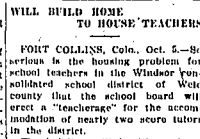
