GET COUNTY NURSES PAY

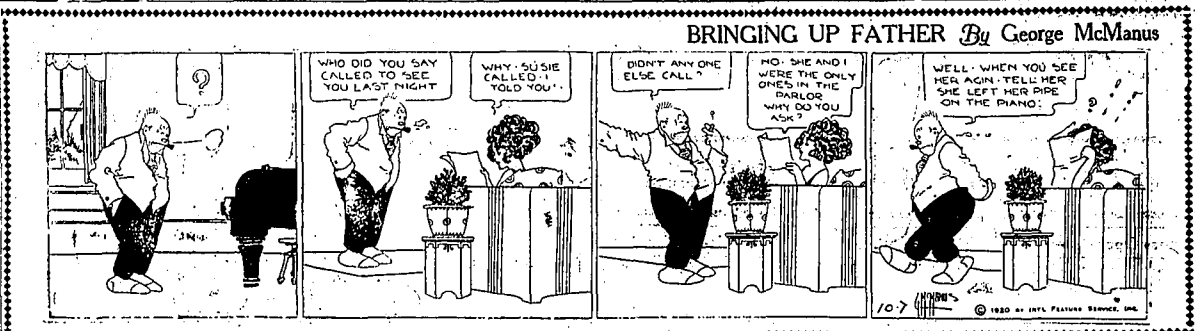
