FARMS YIELD SMALL RETURN

Agriculture Survey Discloses Small Profits Over Period of Several Years.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12. Figures on farm profits, covering seven years in two areas and five years in the third, were made public by the United States department of agriculture today.

These figures show that the average farm income of the 25 farmers in the groups studied has been making large profits during the recent years of comparatively high prices.

That higher farm returns on investment increased from about 4 per cent in 1911 to 7 per cent in 1919.

That most of them are making less than \$100 profit per year over and under the things the farm furnishes toward the family which, however, constitute a very important factor.

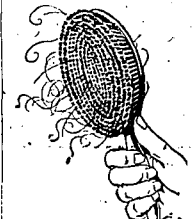
The facts brought out in this report are of special significance since they represent the results of continued years of special investigations thus far completed by the department.

Specialists of the office of farm management and farm economics, who have conducted these investigations, say that while the results will be fairly making that generalization that the farm profits are for the country as a whole, they believe that the results are for the country as a whole, they believe that the results are for the country as a whole, they believe that the results are for the country as a whole.

The three groups of farms studied are located, respectively, in Washington county, 125 farms, built on 100 to 7 years in Clinton county, 100 farms, corn belt, 7 years, and in Wisconsin 100 farms, dairy region, 5 years. Representatives of the department visited these farms year after year, taking records.

covering the farm bushes under the following heads: Crop yields. Amount of work stock and other livestock. Amount of labor used. Amount and distribution of farm capital.

Amount and distribution of receipts and expenses. Value of the family living obtained from the farm.

Amount of the more important products sold, and prices received. From the figures thus obtained, the farm income (gross less expenses) and the labor income (farm income less few per cent on investment) have been computed for each farm and for each group of farms.

The average farm income of the 25 farmers visited in Washington county, 1916, was \$109, the labor income, \$276; the return on investment, 4.6 per cent. In addition to the farm income, the farmers had food and fuel, 1912 return, estimated to be worth over \$200 labor income every year on the average, \$100 per year.

Average labor income and less about 10 per cent of the whole time, 15 per cent of the average \$100, and for 1919 the labor income was \$172. These farms are in a hilly section, where the soil is not especially fertile.

The 100 farms in Clinton county, Indiana, being on better land than the Ohio farmers, made a correspondingly better showing. Their farm incomes averaged \$1,356 for the seven years, 1910 and 1919-18, and their labor income, \$523. Return on capital was 5.7, and food, fuel, and house rent furnished by the farm, \$422. The average farm income of these farms increased from \$1,242 in 1910 to \$2,876 in 1919.

The farm income of the 60 Wisconsin farms averaged \$1,333 for the seven years, 1913-18, the labor income, \$408, and return on investment, determined by deducting from the farm income the value of the farm, 4.3 per cent. The average farm income jumped from \$1,073 in 1913 to \$1,900 in 1918, its most of these farms the principal source of income is dairying.

Of the 185 farmers in the three areas, more made a labor income of \$1,000 for every year of the study, but 15 in the Indiana area and 7 in the Washington area made labor incomes averaging over \$1,000 per year.

Four farmers (2 per cent of the entire number) made over \$200 labor income every year on the average, \$100 per year. "There is no horse in the world equal to Man o' War."

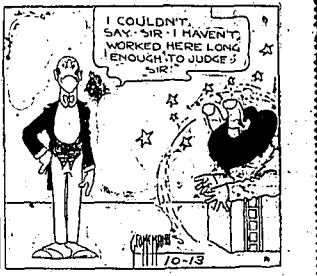
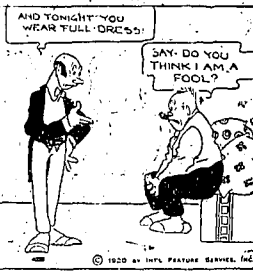
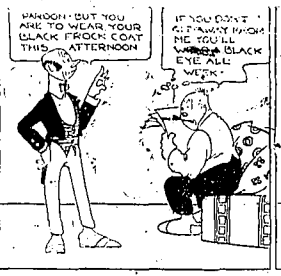
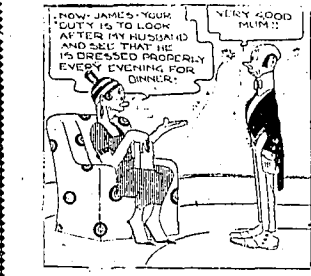
The race was the last Man o' War will run, according to Samuel Goldblatt, his trainer, who will sell the colt for breeding purposes.

In the preliminary Knappe Callahan, St. Josephs, and Babe Archer, St. Louis, boxed a six round draw. "Red" Lusk, Louisville, afterwards championed Levinsky when Alford Thomas, French champion.

HEALTH NEWS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The United States public health service, which for some time has been making special efforts to facilitate the diagnosis of tuberculosis and other diseases, has announced that it is possible to hold similar courses for the benefit of physicians who may desire to attend.

The instruction is given by recognized experts in the diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis and is supplemented by the showing of a remarkable motion picture, in six reels, which minutely illustrates every phase of the disease.

The United States public health service will send its training hospital in Chicago as a general clearing house for soldiers and sailors returning from the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, who are suffering from nervous and mental diseases.

Dr. L. M. Wilbur, surgeon of the public health service, left for Chicago to take charge.

Any member of the military or naval forces of the United States who may come or be sent to the hospital for observation and diagnosis will receive, in addition to the services of the general public health service, surgeons who are many Dr. Wilbur, the benefit of all the facilities for diagnosis afforded by the best instrumental resources and expert neuro-psychic talent of the great city.

If the patient may be returned to his home with or without instructions to report from time to time to the hospital for further observation, he may, if desired, be referred to any hospital as may seem best suited to his condition. Before returning a patient to his home, his condition and the probable course upon him will be carefully considered.

Dr. Wilbur has a distinguished record, particularly in New York, where he served in both private and state hospitals, and in the well-known New York Neurological Institute.

The hospital, which will start with 120 beds, has an allowance of \$25,000 for furnishings and other purposes. It will serve as a clearing house for the eighth district of the public health service.

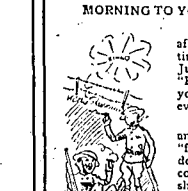
