### PLENTY OF LUMBER.

In regard to the lumber market the American Lumberman of Chicago, says:

"Lumber manufacturers in all parts of the country have on hand ample reserve supplies of lumber to meet any immediate demand no matter how rapidly the housing situation may develop. Manufacturers as a whole have apparently adopted the policy of producing and putting in pile a normal supply of lumber and when this normal level is reached production will be curtailed to prevent undue accumulation." For example, a number of telegrams received by the American Lumberman indicate that hardwood manufacturers on the west intend to continue production until normal stocks are on hand and thereafter will materially curtail production. In fact a number of the manufacturers at this time are curtailing production somewhat, so that they may continue to offer employment to their men and at the same time accumulate stocks slowly.

Hardwood stocks on the whole, have not as yet reached the normal level. Out of a list of 18 representative companies in the South and East only five reported normal or above normal stocks.

"The demand for Southern Pine, Douglas fir, North Carolina pine, hemlock and other ordinary construction wood continues to be light. Shipments are not heavy because of lack of orders and also because in some sections the war shortage continues to be so severe that shipments cannot be made. The specialty woods, such as cypress, are meeting with a very heavy demand and prices have a rising tendency.

"Plans under discussion in many of the larger cities for stimulating building and encouraging more general home owning are approaching consummation and the increasing indications that the money market is easing up and bankers will look with more favor upon building loans give promise of an early resumption of building on a more extended scale that will go toward relieving the universal housing shortage."

### SAVINGS BANKS FOR WORKING GIRLS.

A NEW development in banking which also may be considered as an adjunct to the thrift campaign is the savings bank for working girls. As The American Banker quotes from the new columns of the Philadelphia Public Ledger:

In a part of St. Louis where within a radius of six blocks there are 44 factories employing 10,000 girls, a savings bank for working women has been established. Miss Olivia Henneghan is the head of it. Associated with her as directors are 10 girls from the Industrial Service center club.

Deposits of 25 cents and upward are accepted, upon which 3 per cent interest is paid.

The bank is open only two nights a week—Mondays and Thursdays, from 5 to 9 o'clock. The deposits go to the National Bank of Commerce.

Miss Henneghan says there is no intention to make money, the sole purpose being to start working girls on the road to saving, no matter how little, so long as it is regular, and then teach them how to make safe and profitable investments after they have accumulated a certain amount.

Four hundred girls are associated with her in the undertaking. There are Industrial Service Center clubs in eight American cities, and she expects all of them to introduce the savings bank for working girls plan.

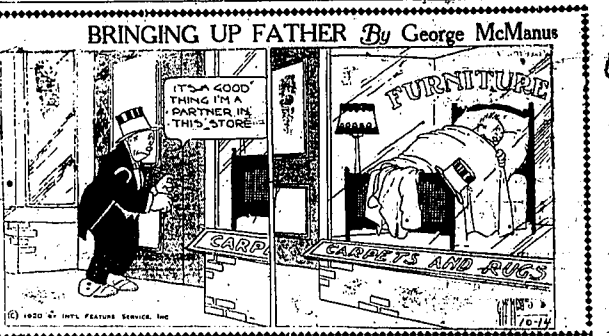

Standard and Sinclair showed a narrow half-month margin which is responsible for the market's conservative credit so that there will be funds for long time hereabouts to provide for the needs of the country's permanent equipment, railroad building and repair, and necessary housing construction. The market closed with a general improvement in the banks of the country's clearing banks in view of these foregoing considerations. Since the banks touch all phases of industry and business they are able to obtain a broader view of the total business situation than any individual business.
