Three Dollars an Acre a Year Levied on Land by Director of Canal Co.

The water maintenance charge for land under the South Side Twin Falls Canal Co. will remain the same for the season of 1921. The canal board recently by the board of directors of the company. Three dollars an acre is the rate for water rights. The two-thirds due and payable on March 1, and the other third due by September 1. Moved by Kennedy and seconded by Jones that the secretary be authorized to issue the stock covering lands under the High Line Canal Co. to the parties in interest, in one block as it is at present, and that all delinquent charges be paid in full. Carried unanimously. Moved by Brown and seconded by Jones: Resolved that for the purpose of maintaining and operating the water works of this company, and of conducting the business of the corporation, and meeting the obligations thereof to be met there is hereby authorized against all the lands to which water and water rights belonging to the corporation, is dedicated or obligated, regardless as to whether it is used or for said land, and the owners or holders thereof, and that all other lands upon which it is actually used, and the owners and holders thereof, and against each and all of the stockholders and other holders in this corporation, a toll, assessment in charge of the sum of \$1.00 per acre, share of stock, and the same to be paid in installments as follows: On or before

March 1, 1921, \$2.00, and on or before September 1, 1921, \$1.00. The total amount covered due from said land, or the owner or holder thereof, or the owners or holders, of such shares of stock, shall be based on the number of shares or water rights held or owned, by the owner of such land, equitably and reliably. And that the officers of the corporation be and the same are hereby directed and authorized, to collect each toll as assessment and charge, and to take such steps as may be necessary to proceed towards securing the same, including, or foreclosing any lien, which this corporation may have, on account of said levy, or to otherwise collect the same, and furthermore, the general manager of this corporation is authorized and directed, to refuse to deliver to any water user or claimant, any water from or through the irrigation works of this corporation, until said toll, assessment and charge, has been fully paid, or the same is secured to the satisfaction of the secretary of this corporation.

ABSENTEES MAY VOTE BY MAIL

Auditor Higgins Authorized to Receive Ballots Through Postal Service.

If the voter did not register for the primary election it will be necessary to do so by the night of Saturday, October 30.

People who expect to be away from home on election day can have their votes by following this procedure:

In order that a qualified voter of this state may vote by mail from his present out-of-town location he must have been duly registered in his present county.

A voter absent from his precinct may vote by mail within the state of Idaho or outside of the state.

Application for ballot to be voted at the election.

In the _____ election precinct, I expect to be absent from said election precinct on the date of said election. I hereby apply for an official ballot or ballots to be voted by myself at such election.

(Official Title)

The foregoing blank will be furnished by County Auditor Higgins upon request, but if an absentee has his application, he may use the above form for the purpose of obtaining a ballot.

This application must be duly signed and sworn to by the elector applying for the ballot, before an official authorized to administer oaths.

The voter should arrange to get his ballot as early as possible as it returns to his county auditor at least 24 hours before the election. It should be returned earlier if possible so as to avoid the chance of losing the ballot through delay in the mails.

The voter should be careful to give the county auditor his correct postoffice address so that his ballot will reach him promptly and safely.

In lieu of the above the following method may be used where practicable:

Any voter knowing that he is to be absent on the day of election may at any time not more than fifteen days before the election call at the office of the county auditor for his county and obtain a ballot voting it at the said office, sealing it and depositing it with that officer, before leaving his home.

TRUE PATRIOTISM

In a speech delivered at Parkersburg, W. Va., on September 29, Senator Harding said:
"I have been preaching to my countrymen a gospel readily expressed in two words, namely, in all our thoughts and in all our actions and in all our purposes let us be for America first."

"I have been preaching to my countrymen a gospel readily expressed in two words, namely, in all our thoughts and in all our actions and in all our purposes let us be for America first."
The meaning papers, that someone has taken up that slogan and tried to compare it with that used by the Germans during the war. Somehow or other the comparison has appeared to me, and I noted in a colloquy between the Democratic nominee and a citizen of German origin that it was attempted to make the slogan "America first" appear as one of selfishness and an ultimate menace for us in our relations with the rest of the world.

"I do not know that I can pronounce correctly the well known slogan of the Germans, 'Deutschland uber alles,' but this meant, 'I understand it, that they were making Germany first, and I beg to remind my countrymen that under that spirit in forty years of practice in Germany, under that slogan, Germany became industrially the most eminent, educationally the most influential, progressively the most notable, as well as well known in the accomplishment of art and most conspicuous in welfare-commerce of the people in the world."

"Under the spirit of promoting nationality in the interest of the people that wonderful land came from an inconspicuous place to the very forefront of the nations of the earth."

"And do you know what resulted it all? Only the arrogance and autonomy of one man, who turned the influence and popularity of a great people into the one tragic spectacle of all history. And now I take the lesson from Germany, and warn you, my countrymen, let us never have a man dictatorship in the United States."

"Ours is representative, popular government, where the will of the people is supposed to be popular, where intelligent public opinion, reached in deliberation and reflection, becomes the ruling law of the public if public officials are responsive thereto as they should be, and I promise you when I am elected president of the United States, as I expect to be on November 2, the will of the American people, not the presidential will, will be the rule of this land of our."

"This is the language of one who is content to serve his fellow citizens, rather than ambition to rule those who believe that the interests of the home country should come first, who place patriotism before internationalism; who, in a government of the people, by the people, for the people, is content to have the people rule through the constitutional forms of government; who believes that it is time for Kaiserism to end in this country as it has ended in Germany; who believes in the Americanism of George Washington, rather than in the Imperialism of Woodrow Wilson; one who does not claim to "know it all," is not anxious to "do it all," nor ambitious to "be it all," who is not for self first, but for "America first."

PREACHING COAL ECONOMY

WHILE admitting the desirability of economizing in the use of coal, so as to make each ton go further, the Iron Age believes that the spirit in which some pronouncements to this effort are made is not calculated to stimulate further progress. The spirit in some cases, it says, is that of proclaiming that the nation has been, is now, and is likely to continue to be, unless it promptly takes the advice offered, very wasteful in its coal consumption. We read:

"It is conducive to progress to insist that we have all been sinners and are all just as big sinners now. That view-point affords a touch of consolation for the individual. Incidentally it is not true at all. There is scarcely an employment of coal in which a great deal of progress has not been made in some, not simply during the last few years past, but during many years. If it were possible to classify all the uses of coal to state the total amount that would be required if all in a given line used the best methods that are practised by some the amount would be very much less than the amount now required. The better method of approach is to point out that there are already in existence models of efficiency in industries that need to be reformed in toto, but instead the lag-gards need to catch up with the most progressive. The iron and steel industry, for instance, shows some fine examples of efficiency. The by-product coking process is in very large part the property of the iron and steel industry, and there are in existence by-product ovens capable of carbonizing in the neighborhood of ten per cent of the total bituminous coal production of the country. That represents a very substantial amount of progress, and more than two-thirds of that progress has been made in the past ten years. We are not standing still. Then in the matter of power generation great progress has been made in the past ten or twenty or twenty-five years. At long range view the progress has probably been more and more rapid as time passed. It is by emphasizing the fact that some men in the industry have been making much progress that those who are negligent can best be stimulated to do their part. It requires no great knowledge to see that if we do our work of today by the methods that were prevalent twenty years ago we should be consuming vastly more coal than we now require. We have economized in the use of fuel and we must simply continue to do so and with more vigor."





Most of the wheat crop has already been threshed, and the yield by sales indicates that an excellent start has been made. The record yield so far has been secured by Harry Saville, who has a field of Marquis wheat that rolled out at the rate of 35 bushels per acre.

Rapid improvements are being made by the settlers, and the country resembles a three or four-year-old country, according to Mr. McLean.

Permanent improvements are being put on to farms and rabbit-hunt fences help appearance by the farmers have erected vast rock houses and commodious barns dot the country.

Roads Are Built.—There are 8,000 feet of the project besides the big Roseworth ranch, which consists of 1,120 acres. All of the big ranch is under cultivation, and 2,600 acres of the remaining portion of the project was broken out of sage brush this season. More will be cleared next spring.

Water supply for the project is secured by starting water from Cedar creek, House creek, Devil's creek and Snake creek. The water from Cedar creek is diverted by canal a distance of five miles to the project.

A guarantee of the delivery of two acre feet of water at the farm house is given by the company. Government figures for the past nine years show a flow of water from the four creeks average 100,000 acre feet per annum. At present the reservoir is half full of water.

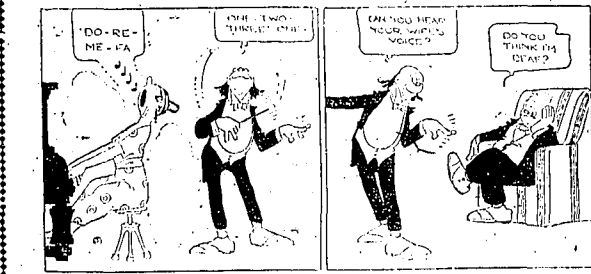

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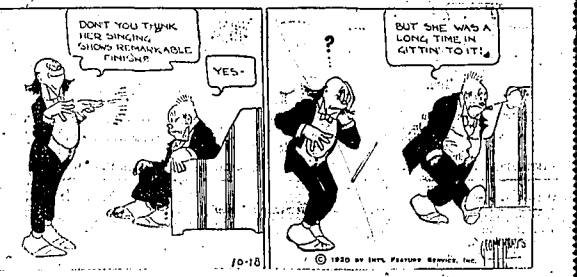

NEW BASEBALL CONSTITUTION CONSIDERED BY CLUB OWNERS

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (UP). Adoption of a new "charter" for organized baseball was decided upon today at a meeting of representatives of 11 major league clubs and John Heydler, president of the National League.

The inmates on hand for the meeting were unable to discuss the matter before the next opening. It was known the majority hoped to get down to a discussion of the proposed constitution today.

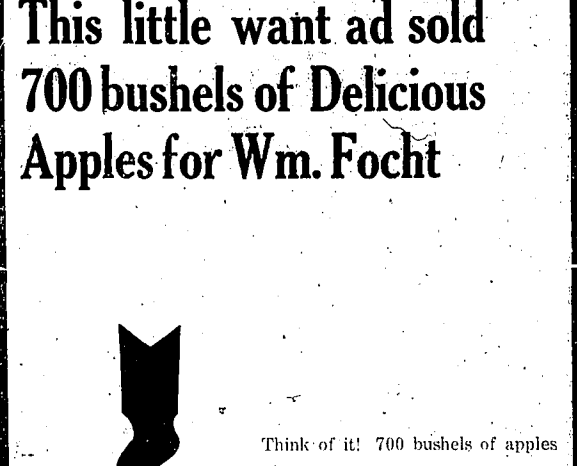

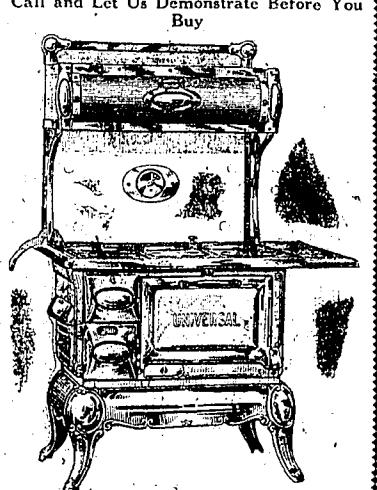
