Meredith declared the average price of all crops on October 1 was 14 cents lower than the same day, 1919.

FRANCE GETTING BACK TO NORMAL

IMPORTANT changes in the attitude of the French people generally, resulting in a very rapid return to the economic stability which was one of their chief characteristics before the war, were noted by Charles H. Labin, president of the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, who has just returned from a trip to Europe, as one of the most interesting developments of the European situation.

In giving some of the results of his observations there, Mr. Labin stated:
"The most significant result noted in Europe during my brief visit there was the rapid return of the French people to their morale which followed the ending of the war which characterized France, as well as other belligerent countries, seems to have been completely overcome, and in every important respect, national and individual, France is on her way back. Her new tax program promises to produce a sufficient volume of revenue to care for the national budget. Her new government is a solid and sane one, which is functioning most intelligently in the emergency. Her people have returned to their old habits of thrift and productive effort, which promise a rapid restoration of economic stability. An increasing percentage of exports and a lower percentage of imports mark the change.

"I think it may be safely assured that France has turned the corner of her problem and, while, of course there grave new questions before her, she will be able to meet them.
"Superficial judgments drawn from the more or less sensational discussions of current happenings in the newspapers in either England or France do not give a real picture of the fundamental soundness of their situation and in the manner in which they are working back to normal. The close relations which are being developed with those nations and the absolute necessity of keeping our foreign markets open to American products, as a basis for our own prosperity, of course make their situation more important to us, and it is reassuring to find conditions there generally so good—in fact, much better than I had been led to expect."

TARIFF A BIG ISSUE

BECAUSE but little has been said of the tariff question so far in this campaign it is thought by some that it is not an issue. But it is, in fact, one of the big issues of the present campaign. It has been Democratic free trade legislation that has resulted in burdening the people with numerous forms of federal taxation as a means of raising revenue for the payment of operating expenses of the government. It is estimated, with reasonable accuracy, that during the past seven years a Republican tariff law would have yielded three million dollars of federal income from foreign imports, which sum would have been paid by foreign traders who marketed their goods on American markets, if such a law had been in operation. In the absence of such a tariff law the American people have been taxed unnecessarily for that amount. Through proper tariff legislation, our federal taxes can be reduced. And if the country is favored with a Staley administration, by this means federal taxes will be reduced.

NEW PARNASUS ON WHEELS

IN a rural section of Michigan, where 75 per cent of the population is foreign, an itinerant institute or school is the latest project of the local Americanization worker, a secretary of the Young Woman's Christian Association. Instead of establishing the usual educational and recreation center to which foreign women and girls are invited, this young woman, because of the scattered population, takes her books and other paraphernalia in a Ford car and travels through the country, holding English classes and cooking classes and other study or social clubs in the homes of the women where groups can gather together. The people in this section are chiefly Poles, Finns and Irish who work in the mines. They recently presented the "History of the country" in parent form before the Twenty-five per cent American population of the district.



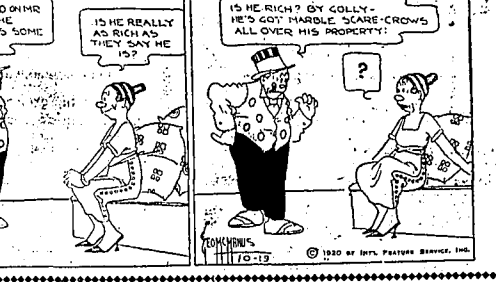

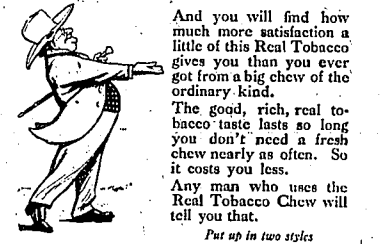
