BANKS CALLED ON TO RENDER AID TO CROPS

Bankers and Farmers Are Closely Allied. Hirsch Declares Joseph Hirsch in Speech.

Co-operation is Needed for Safety and Prosperity of One Depends on the Safety and Prosperity of Other.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (UP)—The safety and prosperity of the banking business depends on the safety and prosperity of farmers, Joseph Hirsch, chairman of the agricultural association of the American Bankers' association, said in his report to the association convention here today.

The report urged the bankers to use their influence toward proposals maintaining the department of agriculture and to help the farmer in marketing his products by encouraging the organization of cooperative warehousing and selling organizations.

Hirsch's report aroused especial interest here because of the recent call of farmers to the treasury and federal reserve board for aid in crop marketing.

### THE NAILS

IF POSSIBLE every woman should have a professional manicure given her nails once in a while, unless she is quite expert at doing them herself. She should also have a professional go over her feet once every few months. The charges for these services are always moderate, and the pain and expense saved later, by the prevention of corns and other troubles is more than worth it. It is like going to a dentist twice a year, to save expensive fillings later.

At home, the nails should receive a little attention each day. The skin should be pushed back with an orange wood stick, to prevent its growth over the nail itself, and any small pieces



of the nail should be clipped off. The nail should be kept filed to a smooth rounded point. Vaseline rubbed into the nails every night will prevent ridges forming, unless there is a quantity of lime in the blood.

For the regular manicure, the nails should be filed to shape, and rubbed with cold cream, after the fingers have been held in tepid warm water. Then the nails are scraped off with a file, the cuticle cut with a nail brush, and all the hard skin cut from the sides, till the nail appears a perfect oval, set in the finger, the bleach is put under the nail. If any is needed, the polish is put on, the nail is polished with a buffer, and with chalk. Then all ranges and ridges are washed off gently, and the nail, pink and perfect, receives its final polish by rubbing it against the skin of the hand.

### Well Known Speakers on Program for Teachers' Meeting Next Week.

She will give one address before the general institute and will hold conference periods for those who desire to discuss school matters with her.

Dr. William H. Carothers, of the State Teachers' College of Emporia, Kansas, will be with us during the year and will have charge of the high school department. Dr. Carothers was one of our popular institute lecturers last year and we are indeed glad to have him return.

Professor Robert Krohn, director of physical education in the Portland, Oregon, city schools, is one of the most popular speakers in the institute. He will be with us during the week and will give general lectures before the institute body. 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# SHORTAGE OF LABOR NEAR

### Help Must Be Passed Around to Finish Harvest Work on Farms.

This careful cooperation must be practiced to avoid a shortage of labor during the last few days of the harvest season. It is the opinion of J. Black, who is associated with Donald McLean in management of the labor department of the county bureau.

At present there is very little work that can be done on the farms, and outside labor is tired of waiting on the "catwalks" to change his axes and leveling. Labor that remains is unable to find work and must live in the meantime, which is sometimes rather hard to stand.

It is too wet to dig, spade, or to harrow best, and there is quite a lot of seed to harvest. Beans in the shock still remain there until the weather takes a change, and the beans and spuds can't be handled until the ground dries. When the sun comes out again, there will be a rush of work all of it demanding to be done right now.

Mr. Black requests that farmers wanting help come to the farm bureau and make that office a clearing house for securing their labor. If this method is followed, the bureau will be able to render a more satisfactory service and labor may be passed around to better advantage.

# Idaho Leads in Clover Seed Production in U.S.

BOISE, Idaho.—Director Johnson of the crop reporting bureau announced that the yield per acre of clover on an average in Idaho last year was 350 pounds greater than any other state. Oregon, second last year, had an average of only 180 pounds, or three bushels to the acre, and states in the east ranked lower still, he said. With regard to alfalfa, clover and timothy seed, Mr. Johnson said:

"Some 607,000 acres were harvested with an average yield of 230 pounds per acre, producing a total of 2,292,000 pounds of seed, compared with last year the acreage increased 20 per cent and the yield per acre was 20 pounds greater. The average yield per acre for the United States is only 220 pounds."

"In the important Alameda-Springfield section, Blainham county, famous for its Grange alfalfa seed, grower conditions and yields have been favorable. The acreage is increasing
