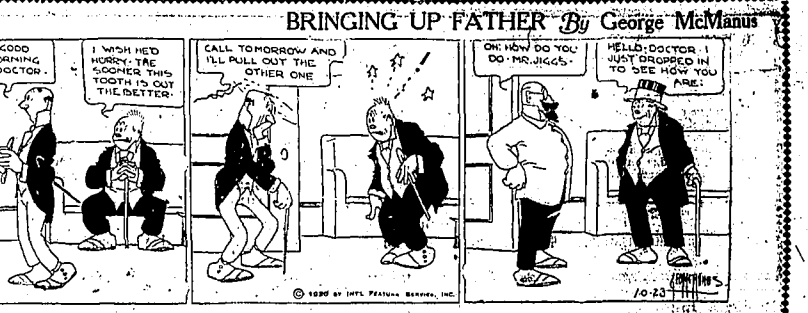
The grand jury also voted new indictments against eight other members of the 1919 Chicago White Sox team, previously named in indictments for throwing the series to Cincinnati.
