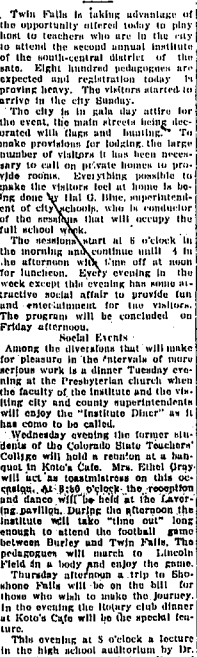

THE STORY OF CROCUS BULBS

Crocus bulbs are cheap. You can buy for a few cents a piece. They will give you much value for your money. That is but one reason why you should get the greatest value out of it. You buy cheaply, but when you go to your garden to show for money, you will have the pleasure of seeing some beautiful flowers bloom from it. They are easy to grow in any soil condition. It will flourish with more bulbs to grow next year. So that your money invested in bulbs may give you value in return for many years. Is that not a way to spend money? Buy your crocus bulbs in large, plant in a three-inch flower pot. The pots are best. If they are plant them in a 3-inch pot, with about half an inch of soil, and set away in a cool place. The cellar floor or the coldest closet is the best place where they can winter. They will be all right. Some bulbs require a long time for their roots to grow. It is best to leave them in the cold place for several weeks. Then at the end of the winter bring them to a warm place and watch the leaves and the growth.

Some of the shoots start look them carefully to see if any aphids (lice) are there. If you find these little greenish insects, wipe the plant aside with a fountain pen and wash the insects off with a brush. A small paint brush will help to dislodge them.

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

REVOLVER SHOT PIERCES KNEE

The accident occurred late in the evening following a hunting trip by Minnerly and Les McCracken. The young men had returned from a quest after duck, and on the trip they carried the revolver in a practice bag, and during the afternoon, Minnerly had emptied the chambers save for one shell. It was while he was extracting this lone cartridge that the explosion occurred.

He was rushed to the county hospital where medical attention was given him immediately. His condition today was reported as very satisfactory, and if no infection results he will be able to return home within a few days. Minnerly is eighteen years old and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Minnerly. He is regularly employed at the Blue Lakes fruit ranch.

RAILROAD MEN WILL GIVE THEIR SUPPORT TO HARDING

POCAHONTO, Oct. 25.—On the national end of the contest between the great parties I am well satisfied that the bulk of the railroad men of the country will vote for Harding," said A. PARENTS MUST BE TEACHERS

Speaker Before Convention Warns Against Abusing Parental Responsibilities.

That many young people have their abilities repressed and their lives wasted before they reach the period of adolescence was the charge made by Dr. A. Lecker, speaker at the convention in Bible school work...

Delegates from the three counties of the Twin Falls convention of Sunday school workers, were represented in the meeting which began Sunday afternoon and which concluded this evening.

Dr. Lecker, who spent many years in the educational work before assuming the duties of a minister and superintendent of Bible Organization for Sunday schools, related experiences that had come to his attention of hearing people whose defects resulted from an unintelligent attitude of parents.

Can you expect your children to be honest when they are taught from an early age by their parents that the speaker asked, "How often have you heard a mother tell a child that if he does not quit crying, she will get a policeman, or visit him in the other dire punishment."

Another common fault resulting in untold loss of self-respect of children is found in the failure of fathers and mothers to answer the many questions that children ask. The divine curiosity of children is the salvation of the race. If that curiosity were lacking the race would soon become imbecile.

The speaker urged that churches give more attention to the youth of their organizations. He declared the measure of the man's or woman's worth was largely decided by the environment and the intelligent understanding of parents.

Other speakers before the convention are Mrs. J. C. Hook, a state officer of Christian Endeavor and Miss W. Wilson, both of Boise, Mrs. E. E. Blomquist of Murtaugh; Mr. Langman of Kimberly. The program is in charge of Rev. C. W. Rank. The convention will end this evening.

CERTIFIED SEED IS PROFITABLE

H. E. Powers, County Agent, Has Many Calls for Wheat and Spuds.

That one way for the Twin Falls farmer to protect himself against fluctuations in prices and uncertainties in the market conditions such as have prevailed during the greater part of this season is to produce certified seed is a remedy offered by H. E. Powers, local county agent.

"We have on the lot in the office letters and telegrams in which our buyers are inquiring from the farm interest as to our ability to furnish them with large lots of both certified seed potatoes and seed wheat. At present I don't have a large lot of certified seed potatoes in the county and the crop of certified seed wheat is not nearly sufficient to fill the demand."

"Over in Canyon county, which is known as an excellent potato country, most of the buyers have been content with a return of 500 an acre on their seed crops. That kind of a result is satisfactory when there is a market. But one young farmer there has devoted his energy to growing a crop of certified seed and he is realizing one thousand dollars an acre and has a ready market for his seed."

The conditions are about the same, Mr. Powers asserts, in the seed wheat field. Local farmers have been conservative in seeding certified wheat, but as the results of such seedlings are becoming apparent, neighbors are getting the certified habit. Growth of seed wheat that can be produced in this section.

To interested farmers in better methods in seed production, the Twin Falls office is planning a meeting to be held at the residence of Mr. H. Bennett of the state university's extension department here to present the results of his close investigations of seed growing over every section of the state. Seed quality, culture of the crop and marketing problems will come in for a share of the discussion.

Local growers who have learned the importance of seed quality and its value in this locality will be asked to give the information they have obtained during their work here.

SELLING SURPLUS VEGETABLES

How to Market the Product of 'Children's Home Gardens After Family Has Been Supplied—The Young Merchant Should Build Up a Reputation for Honesty.

(From School District Home Garden—ing. Bureau of Education)

"After your own home table has been supplied with all the vegetables that it needs you should sell your extra products as fast as they are ready for the market. Your home needs should be met first, but before you attempt to sell to your neighbors, if you have enough vegetables to supply the needs of your own family, you should do a patriotic duty, because in doing so you are making it possible for other vegetables to go to hungry people."

You should not only supply your family needs and pay for the cost of your garden, but you should make a net profit on the vegetables you sell. Don't think it would also be a fine idea to buy your vegetable profits in thrift stamps.

Most selling from a village or city garden is done by marketing among our neighbors. This encourages thrift and business system on your part. It is a practice that you have and might as well try to master. To sell your vegetables readily there are a few things that should be followed:

1. Market all vegetables when they are ripe and ready for the market. Do not pick half-ripe fruits, flowers and those that are ready for a quick sale.

2. Grade your vegetables according to size and quality. Do not have mixture of large and small sizes and good and poor vegetables.

3. Make your display of fruit attractive. Customers will buy more quickly and buy more if the goods offered for sale look neat and clean. Do not put the best vegetables on top while poorer ones are hidden beneath. It would be better to separate

used for selling or displaying your vegetables make them attractive. Build up a reputation for yourself for honesty and fair dealing. THE GIST OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

QUESTIONS ANSWERED FOR THE WOMAN VOTER

By Mrs. George Bass, Chairman Women's Bureau Democratic National Committee

- 1. What is the League of Nations?**
It is a union of the civilized nations of the world (formed by the Treaty of Versailles)—a sort of international society with headquarters in Switzerland.
- 2. What is its Purpose?**
The League seeks to bring about world peace—
(a) By settling disputes between nations by peaceful adjustment instead of by war.
(b) By pledging each member nation gradually to reduce armaments and thereby to reduce the cost of war.
(c) By making treaties public so that all citizens may know what their governments are doing.
(d) By undertaking to better working conditions and the welfare of women and children everywhere.
- 3. Who Belongs to the League of Nations?**
Thirty-seven nations have already joined—all the principal countries (aside from the former enemy nations who are allowed to come in later)—EXCEPTING THE UNITED STATES AND BOLSHEVIST RUSSIA. Any self-governing nation may be admitted and any member may withdraw after two years' notice.
- 4. Why is the United States Outside?**
Because a republican senate, ignoring the fact that our American boys fought and died in a "war to end war," has twice willfully refused to ratify the peace treaty, and so bring the United States into this league for peace.
- 5. How is the League of Nations Run?**
By an assembly of delegates from each nation in the league, for discussion of international affairs. It is something like a big international conference where the small states meet the Big Powers. The assembly may recommend action to the several home governments.
(a) By council of nine delegates (the United States, Great Britain, Italy, France and Japan, to be always represented) which fixes into the course of disputes and makes recommendations for their peaceful settlement. The council is the real governing body of the league.
(b) What is the Rules for the League, including that of secretary, and an equal opportunity to men and women.
- 6. What is the Rules for Women?**
On all points the vote must be unanimous in both houses. Confess to Missouri

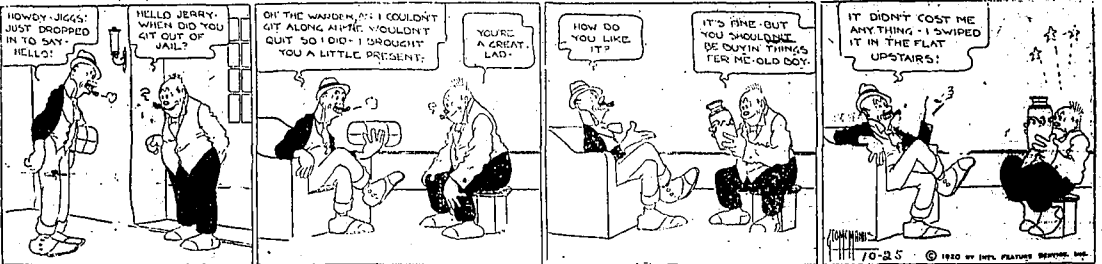

FLOWERS FOR THANKSGIVING

Nigel Barrie Has Appeared in Role of Own Ancestor

(From School Directed Home Gardening, Bureau of Education.)
When school opens in September there are so abundant that we are likely to forget how young Jack Finley came along and "spit their beauty," but the roses, just the water and before Thanksgiving he leaves that but he has a good deal more. So if we want flowers to decorate the dinner table on Thanksgiving day, we had better prepare for them at least by the first week in October.

To grow in water—Find an old tin can jar, a hyacinth glass, or any other jar or pickle bottle, or any other jar that holds water and will cover the mouth. Fill this with water, set the bulb on top so that the water touches the bottom of the bulb. Set it away in a cool, dark closet for two weeks, keeping the jar at the right level. Then bring to the light and water in a window in a room that does not get too hot. The leaves will soon come out of the white sheaths, and the flower stalks will appear a few weeks later.

To grow in soil—Choose an old jar upon which one half sets upon the top, close a broad bowl. Fill the jar with clean pebbles and water and set several bulbs down among the pebbles. This may or may not be placed in a cool, dark closet for a few weeks. The bulbs will come along slowly if not forced too rapidly.

To grow in fiber—Many of the seed houses are offering at small price a specially prepared fibreglass for the growing of bulbs. Choose small water-tight flower jar of dull color. Fill the jar with fiber and water. Place one or more bulbs in the jar. Fill it around them with more fiber and add water enough just to moisten the fiber. Invert the jar to pour off the extra water. Set away in a cool closet for two weeks, then bring to a light room for growth.

HURRY UP JACK-IN-THE-BLIND

(From School Directed Home Gardening, Bureau of Education.)

Every boy and girl knows Jack-in-the-blind as one of the most interesting of the spring wild flowers, but many of them do not know how easy it is to have these flowers in abundance at home or in the school during the winter months.

If in October or November you will set in the places where Jack-in-the-blind grows, you will find it easy to dig for the small bulbs or roots, which are waiting to grow next year. You can bring a few of these to school to plant them in the window box of a lamp flower pot, covering each bulb with an inch of soil.

In water you will find enough to keep the soil thoroughly moist and watch for the coming up of the first green shoots.

In a short time you will see bright light shoots passed through the window and you can watch it grow from day to day. It will become several inches high before the narrow light leaves first show.

A little later the interesting flower will come from between the leaves and will unfold rapidly. It is easy to have a Jack-in-the-blind to reach you as a Christmas present, for this is one of the simplest plants to grow indoors and it reaches full size in a little more than a month.

You will probably be more successful if you leave your bulbs frozen up at least once before you set them in the soil. The reason for this is, of course, the frozen winter months that the bulbs have to stand before they started to grow in the spring.

You should not be satisfied with one Jack-in-the-blind, but try to grow several. This is one of the most interesting forms of plant life, and you will find it as wild and flower looks are interesting information about its structure.

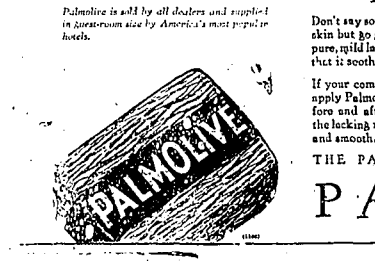

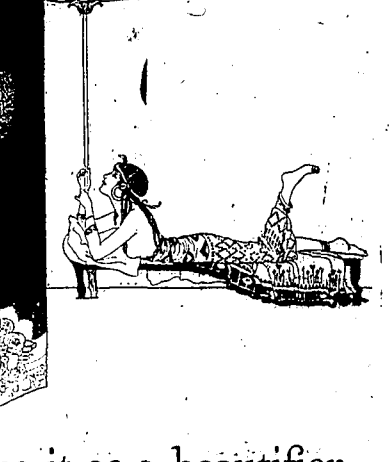
