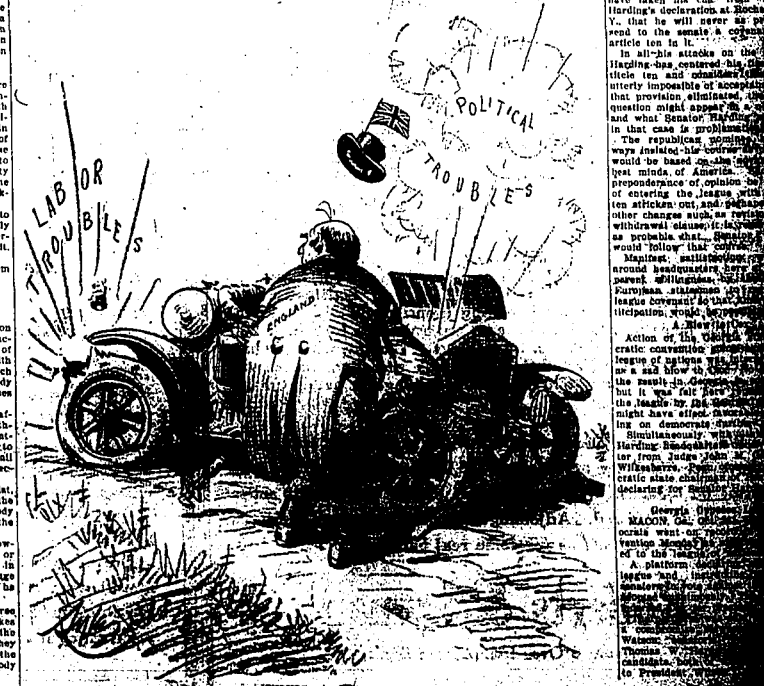

I read his letter to his friend Sid Blackfoot, Idaho. Dear Sid: I've been thinking of you lately and especially since I harvested by crop and I wish you would sell that farm of yours and come and be a neighbor to me more. Why, just think, Sid, you get four or five acres here to your one there. How would you feel with a 400 acre field of grain with head that would average 40 bushels per acre? It only takes two years to pay for a place here and there isn't much work and worry. Let's see you are getting about \$10 per acre for your project. The desired payments on our land, and then you have the case and the labor and when you come to figure it all out it's too darned good. Besides, Sid, you can't tell how long the prices are going to stay and if land values should tumble a little it would hurt where values are so high. Besides, I now just as much per acre as you do and then my land will double in value in the next few years while yours can't possibly double and it's doubtful if it ever gets any higher. And again I get more for my grain than you do as we have a better freight rate to the big milling centers. The next I don't want to discourage you but I've done so much better since I came here and one of my neighbors just across the road who bought last year has been offered twice as much as he paid for his land and he paid all of his desired payments of his second crop. The climate is about the same as it is at

Blackfoot and we can raise just as many bushels as you can. Of course we can't raise all kinds of fruit here, but I would rather farm another acre of wheat and buy my peaches and fruit of that kind. This is an excellent dairy country and you would make good money with your cows. Jim's paid out more bills as a farmer while your cream checks and when I get all the cream in I won't owe but very little on my farm. Of course I got six years of the deferred payments, but I am going to cut out the interest.

By Josh, you'd make a cleaning here because you always did hit the ball a little harder than I did. The trouble with so many of the boys is they don't want to get away from the old town. They think they'd starve if they got away from the old folks. Listen, I can buy my milk out in two more years, and they sure think it's fine. They asked a couple of weeks with us this summer and they're trying to get Sam and Joe to move while they can get such bargains here.

I wish you'd come out and see for yourself. It would do you good. It's a part of God's country and a good place to live.

concerns the general welfare of the people. It is a disagreeable subject and one that we are prone to push aside and leave to chance; and yet there are few things that bring more unhappiness to the human race. In France where the physical and moral welfare of our soldiers was of great importance in order that they might fight with resolute courage and efficiency and be returned to their homes clean and self-respecting, every possible measure was taken to control venereal disease. Rigid regulations were promulgated, but it was this in a general military spirit more than to military prohibitions that our army returned from its victory with a record that has never been equaled by that of any other army in the history of the world.

"We should take every precaution and exercise every good influence to see that our young men and women are free from the ravages of this dread disease, and I sincerely hope the coming conference will do much to accomplish this end."

I haven't the strength to travel that I used to have. I am proud to know, however, that I have helped to give you two members of your administrative committee, Dr. Thomas A. After a lapse of two years, his friends and relatives are again trying to get definite word of his fate and the American Legion Weekly, co-operating with the Times, is trying to aid in clearing up the mystery. If any reader has any information about the death or burial of Lieutenant Saunders, please write to the American Legion, 116, Holdenville, Okla.

One of the many war mysteries that are still unexplained, hundreds of men not all of whom served in the front lines, suddenly received all communication with their relatives. Sometimes the war department said they were "missing in action." Again they were reported killed, and "missing" they have dropped out of sight. Are they victims of airplane and dirigible wander in the blackness unaware of even their own names? They are here in at least one person who can clear up the mystery. It is the writer who has been in conjunction with the American Legion Weekly, in printing the records of missing men.

The action of the institutions handed over to us by our forefathers, in the maintenance of the Republic, is the duty of the American Legion to perform their full duty as citizens, according to their conscience and understanding, such a contingency; it is the duty of the American Legion to maintain the law and order by acting as an individual citizen, and to support the maintenance of the Republic by the individual citizen, as an individual, from whom the Legion, as an organization, will not do so.
