DENY MOVE IS AIMED AT ANY ONE COUNTRY

Fall of German Power

WASHINGTON, March 14.—American naval experts today are considering the Pacific fleet the big one, being only a few fighting ships on the Atlantic coast.

The experts have been called to the attention of President Harding and cabinet are preparing elaborate plans for retention of Secretary of the Navy.

The suggestion to place the whole fleet in the Pacific still is the main live issue in part of a general plan to strengthen American position in the Pacific, which is being considered by the cabinet.

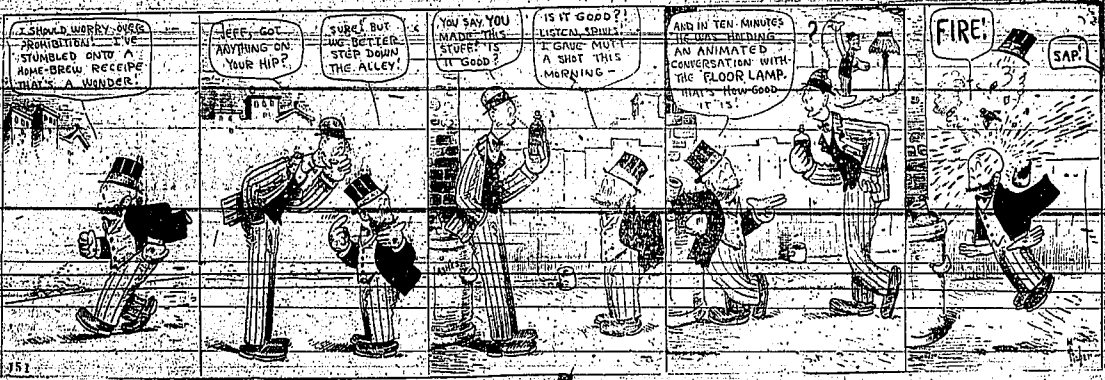
