WASHINGTON, March 14—American naval experts today are considering moving the Pacific fleet to the Asiatic seas, a few fighting ships of the projected "battle fleet" will be sent to the Far East to be available for submarine warfare. Such a transfer of America's sea power to the Pacific might necessitate the abandonment of the Asiatic fleet, which, according to the war office, Hawaii and the Philippines, it is believed, this is being looked into by the new Pacific fleet, probably under command of Admiral Henry H. Wilson, now commander of the Asiatic fleet. The present commandant of the Pacific Squadron is likely to be relieved in the near future.




