Old Menace Cases Arrested

Twenty-two auto drivers arrested Wednesday by police officers on the highway between Twin Falls and Hailey, Idaho, were identified last night by Police Judge M. H. Lockhart when it was proved that the license plates of the cars were forged. March 12th. Three drivers paid fines of \$5. each for forging a \$4 bond which they had to pay before being released. 




