# Japan Refuses Recognize U. S. Claim

## Notes Reveal Intention To Hold Mandate On Yap

### Mikao Government Vorges on Open Sarcasm In Reply to American Notes Which Uphold U. S. Claim to Vose in Mandate.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Japan's firm determination not to surrender the island of Yap is stated emphatically in a series of five notes between the United States made public by the state department.

The correspondence covering a period of nearly six months lays bare for the first time the whole secret negotiations over the island of Yap which has created one of the most serious international issues of the day.

The correspondence today reveals for the first time that not only has Japan defied the American protest against the mandate over Yap but that it also rejected summarily a proposal by the United States that even if Yap should be assigned under mandate to Japan all other powers should have free and unhampered access to the island for the landing and operation of cables.

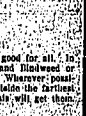
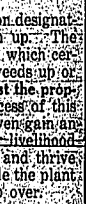

METHODS OF ELIMINATION

Control methods are governed largely by the conditions under which the plant grows. No one had that this will hold good for all. General it may be said that persistence of effort is necessary if positive results are to be obtained. For Canada Thistle and Bindweed or the like around the infested spot, after having striped the soil around the weeds as recommended, (1) whenever possible, flip the spot covered with water so that no larvae exist aboveground in the treatment are as vital as possible. This will get them under the soil and keep them there.
