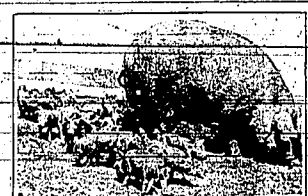

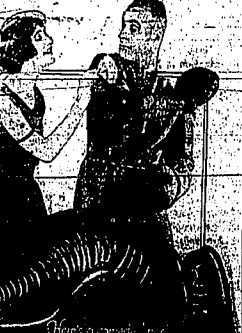

Water for irrigation is supplied from Hayden Lake through a 42-inch pipe line. The district is organized as an irrigation district and is entirely free from bonded indebtedness. Such funds as are necessary for repairing and maintaining the system are raised by direct assessment. The affairs of the district are managed by a board of directors elected by the people.

In addition to a splendid irrigation system, the district owns a complete domestic water system, where water is supplied under pressure from a reservoir and piped throughout the district. The district owns its own pumping equipment and has just erected a fine, modern home for its water superintendent. This indicates the kind of community enterprise prevailing in the district.
