JAPAN ASKS DISCUSSION OF PEACE EAST

Believed to Be Playing for Time; New Man Denies Nation Seeks Domination

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Japan has asked the United States for an amendment to the proposed discussion of Pacific problems in the forthcoming disarmament conference in Washington, it was learned today.

It was understood that the Japanese inquiry was made in the reply received yesterday, according to Japanese acceptance of the American offer.

This amendment is understood to be a demand that the discussion of the Pacific problem be taken up to be made a condition to Japanese acceptance of the American offer.

Most Accept Principle. The Japanese government has been asked to accept the principle of the Pacific conference, the discussion of the Pacific situation, later there will be discussion of the Pacific situation.

It is understood that Secretary Hughes is expected to reply to the Japanese inquiry, calling this as the first step in the discussion of the Pacific situation.

Playing for Time. "WASHINGTON, July 15.—"Playing for time," was the expression put forward by an authoritative source here for the suggestion of Japan's reply to the American proposal for a conference on the Pacific problem and Far Eastern affairs. All other nations accepted fairly but, perhaps, not so readily as Japan.

Other explanations were that Japan is determined to discuss the Pacific problem, but that the powers will be sought out as an alternative for the conference.

They have done so on the ground that Borah, as the senatorial spokesman for the American people, is the only one who can give the subject such deep study that it will be a success among the American representatives.

There is also a deeper reason, which is effect, in that it is hoped that Borah would be able, if only a member of the American commission and given some freedom of action, to bring about results which could obtain the approval of the senate.

Borah holds the official position of leadership in the senate, but his friends and foes alike are sure that he will "handle" that body.

CLARA BARTON'S HOME

The Woman's Universalist Missionary society, a national organization connected with the Universalist church, has acquired title to the homestead of the late Clara Barton on Taft hill, in North Oxford, Massachusetts. It is probable that the Barton summer home also will be acquired. The society plans to preserve the properties intact in honor of the memory of the founder of the American Red Cross.

The Barton homestead consists of the house in which Miss Barton was born; farm buildings and eighty-five acres of land. Miss Barton's summer home is in Worcester and consists of a two and one-half acre property.

Miss Barton was one of the most active and interested members of the Universalist church. Her missionary work of all kinds at home and in foreign lands, was of especial interest to her. It is to commemorate her work in that field and her affiliation with the society that the organization decided to obtain the property.

The society will restore the memories of Miss Barton's childhood and will make the place a memorial home for visitors. Plans for the restoration of the property are being made. The society also plans to place a statue of Miss Barton and these will be placed on exhibition. Similar plans will be followed at the summer home if it is bought.

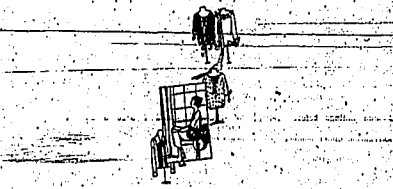
