PROVE THE GUILT, PUNISH THE GUILTY

According to Chairman Lusk of the new shipping board, President Harding was unmindful and distressed when the facts as to the financial chaos in the shipping board were laid before him. Unmindfulness and distress are hardly strong enough words to express the feelings of the nation's long-suffering and overburdened taxpayers.

The situation as disclosed by Lusk's analysis is emblematic of governmental history which for stupidity, recklessness, inefficiency and utter disregard of the public interest, is without precedent. Whether or not the element of downright dishonesty is also present, Lusk does not say. But he gets pretty close to it when he makes this significant statement: "The books of the board are not, in a commercial sense, books as to what. If a purposeful effort had been made to keep the books as to what and defend Congress and the country, they could have been kept in no very different manner."

Hundreds of millions of dollars of loss to the public are involved in the financial wreck.

Systematic and persistent deception of the public and Congress by officials and employees of the shipping board is a feature of the wreck, which in some respects is the worst of all.

For example, when Congress appropriated the sum of \$200,000,000 for the old shipping board for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, it was told that that covered the board's operations. As a matter of fact the cost of three operations was \$180,000,000, nearly four times as much.

The vast sum of nearly \$200,000,000 has got to be made up this year, at a time when every effort of the government is being directed toward economy.

Lusk very charitably absolves certain officials of the old shipping board from blame for the bookkeeping system on the ground that "the system has been in use from the start, long and far before we were in charge of it."

That is what the fact-finding public wants to know. It is obvious that the responsibility for this reckless, if not criminal waste of public money lies somewhere.

"Let's have a congressional investigation," did we hear some body suggest?

For goodness sake, stop at such a farce as that. A congressional investigation would mean that at the end of a year or so we would get a partisan report which would be absolutely ineffective. This seems to be a case which calls for investigation and action by the federal grand jury.

If there has been crime, the criminals must be found and punished.

If there has been merely recklessness, carelessness and stupidity, the least that can be done is to drive the reckless, careless and stupid from the public service.

BLONDS SUFFER MOST

Blonds suffer more than brunets from Summer heat, says a Twin Falls doctor. The reason? Because blonds belong in the cold north, brunets near the equator.

"The brunets—born from the coalblack African to the white-skinned Twin Falls person with dark hair and eyes—have in their skin a pigment called melanin, which protects them from the sun's life active rays.

The blond type originated in northern Europe and Scandinavian countries where, not needing this melanin protection against solar heat, they were developed. It means they suffer most in scorching summer.

Any workman will tell you that the coal-black shirt is the best against a burning shirt. It insulates, keeps out the heat.

The color of your hair and eyes, scientists say, determines your character, disposition and degree of intelligence.

The tropical brunet, with his living growing on trees and obtainable without much effort, becomes sluggish, lazy, looting under the palm, the blond—born in a cold climate—thinks "Twin Falls" is merely very important philosophy and religion originated in or from the tropics.

The blond, natural inhabitant of the north, had to work harder for a living. That made him strong, rousing to the physical instead of the intellectual.

REGROUPING OF BUREAUS; PLAN

Harding to Recommended More to Secure Economy and Efficiency Gains.

WASHINGTON—President Harding has recommended that the executive branch of the government be regrouped into a more efficient organization.

The plan is to include the following recommendations: (1) Creation of a department of public works.

(2) Transfer of the prohibition enforcement machinery from the treasury department to the department of justice.

(3) Consolidation of all "bureau" offices, under the department of justice.

(4) Location of possible splitting up of the bureau of fisheries.

The plan which is being directed by Walter P. Reuther will be directed by the cabinet and submitted to the joint congressional committee on the organization of the government.
