BUHL'S SCHOOL SITUATION

If reports that Buhl is "feeling the prospect of being without schools next term" are true, and there seems to be no reason to doubt the reliability of such reports in view of the recent school election there, it would appear to be no more than doing a scoundrelly trick to suggest the calling of a special election there to approve or disapprove a additional school levy. In fact it seems most unlikely that Buhl will neglect taking that step to protect the educational interests of her children and the reputation of the community.

Reports, regarded as reliable, say that the Buhl district is without funds, that warrants for fuel and other items are being "shied at," and that no teachers can be hired for next term. An extra levy of 10 mills is said to be necessary to meet the expense for next term. The earliest date which a special election can be called is August 12, thirty days following the last school election held there.

OUR NEW RAILROAD

Granting of the interstate commerce certificate authorizing construction of the proposed new railroad between Wells and Rogerson is rightly, regarded as the successful achievement of the project. This is because, the way has now been cleared, it appears, for the people at home, who, still faced with the big task of raising the sum pledged to the railroad line, will wish to do this time in securing a benefit so vital to all.

It is believed that the question of whether or not the railroad promoters are capable of financing the line was answered by the interstate commerce commission itself, in granting the certificate.

This would not have been granted, it is thought, unless assurances were shown that the line was a feasible, practical proposition, waiting only upon official permission.

The tremendous advantages of the new line have been so thoroughly explained before that it is hardly necessary to review them.

Suffice it to say that the recent problems of freight rates and services have impressed the need of relief so clearly upon the residents of the Twin Falls country that there will be no hesitation nor delay in clinching the way out, as offered in the Wells-Rogerson outlet.
