## NEED OF PUBLICITY

At the same time that motion picture advertising of Idaho is being put out a more earnest effort should be made to broaden the field of publicity. This is the opportune moment, and unless the state is to lag behind, all the available forces should be concentrated on the task of making Idaho the most talked of section in the West. More reels should be made, and this fall and winter the circulation of Idaho's pictures should cover the whole country. Let us not forget that we are not without strong competition. Canada is utilizing pictures and lecturers all over the United States. California has invested many hundreds of thousands of dollars in similar propaganda. Oregon, Washington, Montana, several other states are in the field. We, in Idaho, may justly be charged with failure to measure up to the golden chance which is open for us if we are not quick to get into the game.

For every dollar invested in motion pictures and their proper circulation, ten will be returned to the state. We need more publicity with money and muscle to develop the natural resources of our state, which are more abundant and varied than anywhere else in the West. This is not the time to cry poverty. We have an unequal opportunity right at hand to bring prosperity to every line of business in the state. We are indebted to the reclamation service for his cooperation, but we must not forget that the real success of any plan to develop Idaho is dependent in a large degree upon ourselves.

Let us all get together and make Idaho so well known that it shall forever cease to be merely a thoroughfare for hundreds of thousands journeying westward. Let us make the state known for the majority of these travelers.

## Church and the Re-establishment of Old-Fashioned American Home

The nation is gradually putting its house in order, but neither the President by executive decree nor the Congress, by the enactment of legislation, can wholly return the country to a normal state.

The solution of our problems, both social and industrial, will not be very difficult when the citizen himself decides to return to a state of normalcy; and it is in this connection that the church, I think, has a duty to perform, the importance of which cannot be over-emphasized.

The first line of defense of the republic from the enemy without and the enemy within is not the army, but the home. This great nation was founded on the little group of semi-Christian homes that constituted the Plymouth colonists, and it is the American home that America gives its greatness and power, not to its commerce, its mighty fleets, or its military strength. It is the source of our strength and we cannot afford its influence or importance without dangerously weakening the very foundation of the republic.

To keep the homes fit and bold-faced and, I, W. W., and all, quickly die of inanition.

There are abroad in the land influences which are steadily undermining the home life of America, and the tendency of our modern life is to seek a substitute for the home. In returning the nation to a state of normality, our first duty is the re-founding of the family, the integrity and the importance of the American home.

The church is in most intimate relationship with the home than any other agency in the body politic, and in these days of reconstruction the church can, if it will, exert a stabilizing and sobering influence in a time when man, if not inclining to think so, can render the nation and its people greater strife than strike, as its part in the re-adjustment of the affairs of the country, the re-establishment of the old-fashioned American home.

## GRAVE ERROR IN VALUATION IS SET FORTH

Local Men Show Up Unfortunate Mistakes in Method of Rob-  
ertson For Board.

That figure produced by John D. Robertson, on which equalization was based, was not correct in its inference and that this was made clear before the state board of equalization, was the statement made yesterday by W. H. McElroy in Boise from Twin Falls county.

It is said that Robertson in selecting his 10% transfer was guilty of making a number of arbitrary discriminations. For instance, it is said that he put down the lots in

Blue Lakes addition at the amount of \$125 each, while the lots in the first flat did not cost during the four years and that it included water, heat, light, etc., which were not installed. The lots are assessed at \$250 each and the conclusion was drawn that they were assessed at one-half of their actual value.

While the railroads in trying to make their case appear as good as possible claimed that the 10% assessment was only 5% of its value, the Robertson report indicated that the assessment was only 2% per cent of its value. The railroads also claimed a 1% per cent difference between the assessment in this and the average county in the state. Another example of the discrimination was made in Coalfield. A 40 acre piece of land at that town was nominally sold at \$200 per acre, but was assessed at \$72.00 per acre. A quick calculation shows the road assessment to be \$175.20, while the assessed value is \$175 an acre. Robertson's report showed a 1% per cent difference in the railroad and the average as shown by the railroad report.



