IDAHO IS LEADING THE WAY

"The way to reform," said John Sherman, secretary of the treasury in 1870, "is to reform." Action toward the reduction of governmental expenses and taxes and the resultant lessening of the cost of living should be based on the principle implied in Secretary Sherman's dictum. The way to achieve such results is to get about objects which will reduce, for where the will is there generally will also be the way.

Idaho gives evidence of the truth of the course suggested. While congress has been making more or less successful efforts to effect governmental economy and lowering of federal taxes, and while the city and county authorities at Spokane have been wrestling with their fiscal problems for the coming year, the Idaho board of equalization has again prescribed the policy of tax reduction that it inaugurated two years ago.

In 1919 the tax levy for state purposes was 7.50 mills, in 1920 it was 6.50 and in 1921 it is made 5.75 mills only.

MONEY AND MARKETS

Following the entire situation and giving due weight to the fact that the market, looking backward, operations at this time, should be based on probable continuance of rates of levels not far from those now prevailing. This should not be regarded as undesirable, since a stabilization of rates at this level would be in line with the reestablishment of business activities on a sound and permanent basis.

Although there is plenty of money, the demand for it is heavy and any judgment of the future course of money rates must take account of the inter-relationship between bank credit for current financing and manufacturing operations and the requirements for funds for more or less permanent financing. While recognizing the factors for lower money rates, there are powerful forces which tend to maintain them. The visible declines in commodity and security prices have automatically tended to reduce bank deposits at the same time that loan requirements have been falling. In other words, while the decline in the price level does to some extent release surplus supplies it does not necessarily work uniformly in this direction.

The larger influence for maintenance of the rate levels, lies in the fact that surplus funds up in carrying large stocks of unsalable raw materials in various parts of the world. Additional money will also be required from time to time as new crops are produced.

Conditions in July have all tended to confirm the belief that genuine business improvement is under way. Manufacturers in many lines are beginning to express a sense of discouragement; however, because forward orders are not as heavy as they were during the late period of abnormal business activity. It is doubtful whether this is justified. Good business policy requires attention on the part of buyers. Failure to exercise it contributed to the difficulties from which the country is beginning to recover. Smaller orders for early delivery if received in sufficient amount to maintain operations on a reasonable basis are at this time an indication of a healthy condition.

The fact that building operations have persisted in fair volume in the face of many adverse circumstances, is a most encouraging factor in the present situation. Conditions at the opening of the current building season afforded little hope for an active year. Many materials have not come down proportionally with other prices, and in those lines in which price reductions at point of shipment have been slow, freight rates have prevented builders from realizing any great reduction in material costs. Labor conditions at this time, taken together with the general uncertainty of the business outlook has had a depressing effect.

Nevertheless, operations for the first seven months, as measured by the construction index, and permanent construction restricted but not building program decline is already showing through. Although the normal seasonal decline is already showing through, building activity in the current season is of much significance in justifying a confident expectation in a steady if slow business recovery. It is a measure of faith in the future.

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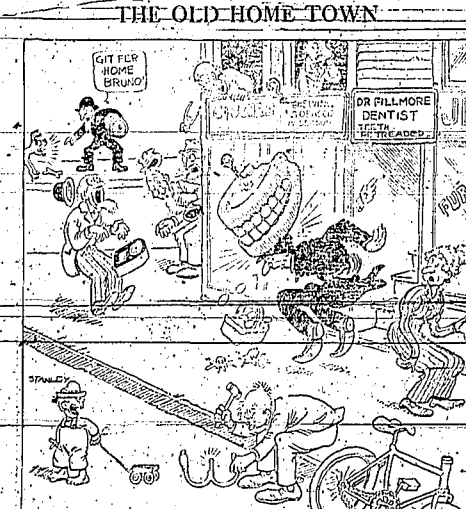
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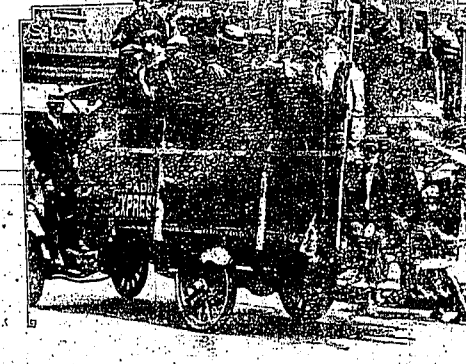
