SIX MONTHS GIVE TASTE OF TROUBLE

Harding Up to His Ears in Progress Shows in Various Ways

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—(Special.) Harding closes his first six months in office tonight with industrial warfare as a high tide away from the White House.

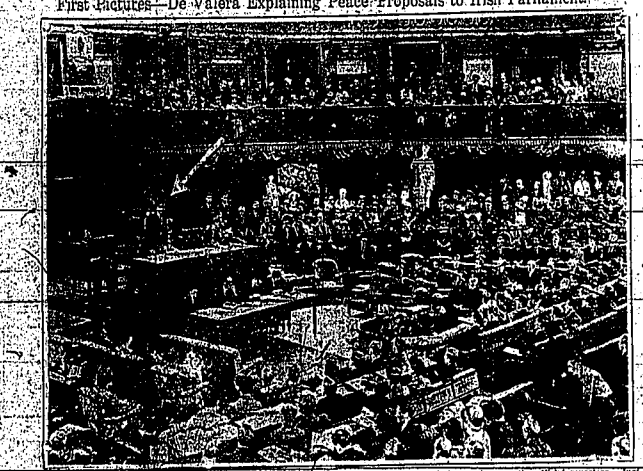

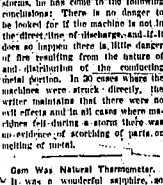

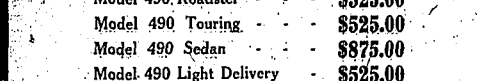
