ONE THOUSAND LIVES LOST IN FLOOD BURST

Reports From the Flood District at Noon Today Stated That 42 Bodies Had Been Recovered. Immense loss of Life and Millions of Damage to Property Reported in San Antonio. Flood burst at Head of Olmos Creek Cause of Disaster. Relief Work Started and Pitiful Sights Noted.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Sept. 10.—Fifteen hundred lives lost and property damage of \$10,000,000 is the latest estimate of city officials at 9 o'clock this morning, as a toll of last night's flood which swept the entire business section of this city and several outlying residential sections, leaving in its path wreckage and ruin.

Forty-two bodies, mostly those of women and children, have been recovered up to this hour and reports of additional dead continue to pour into the police headquarters.

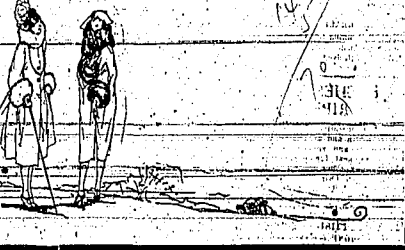

INDICTMENT OF CIVILIZATION

By JAMES D. WHELAN. "More than a score of 'slaves' were sold on the historic tin-pan-nomnom today."

The above dispatch which was sent over the wires to press papers yesterday was the most terrible message to civilization since the news that Germany had invaded Belgium. That veteran of the world war, like Angelo Bivvo of the Canadian army, was among those to whom the auctioneer said: "Go to your master, make the story sound more tragic. But the real tragedy lies in the fact that human beings, able and obviously willing to work, will humiliate themselves to the extent that they will voluntarily offer themselves on the auction-block."

The remedy for this is neither socialism nor bolshevism, but failure to cure such a condition will mean one, or both, the completion of the irrigation and reclamation projects either by the Government, or Senator Borah, or private enterprise, or by both, would help in two ways—temporarily, it would give a relatively few men work, and what is more, it would open some tracks of land to settlement.

After all, these things would do no more than suggest something more far-reaching, which must be permanent. Congressman Keller, of Minnesota, a republican, seems to be on the right track. He aims at adjusting taxes in a way that they will fall most heavily on unearned incomes, on vastly wealthy land holdings and on inheritances, tending to force open sites held out of use for pure speculation and to release capital for development. This measure will be crude. His enactment as drafted might be worse than this. But at least it would suggest a more permanent cure. It will break up the land which should never be perfect or indefinitely held. ADMIRAL FAVORS DISARMAMENT

Sir Cyriac Bridge, retired admiral had British naval authority, believes that naval disarmament was advocated yesterday by William G. McAdoo, would do much to improve the world. In an interview released to the United Press today he says: "What is called the Pacific problem is not in part of the far greater question of 'Asia and the West', the admiral said. 'The latter, great question' in my belief, he settled amicably and to the advantage of both sides if it is taken into consideration with-out delay."

"I have been careful to speak of it as 'Asia and the West', and not 'Asia and Europe,' because I am convinced that both North America and South America will be concerned in it quite as much as Europe."

"It will be a question of a collision—not necessarily armed collision—between ideas, principles, habits, etc., on the one side Oriental, on the other Occidental."

"All America, both North and South, is virtually European—language, policy, laws, etc. The predominant section of all its population is descended from ancestry born in Europe."

"Will the nations on either side of the Atlantic allow that culture to be strangled—eaten heartily—by a culture which may be no good, or even better, but which is certainly different?"

"There is only one way of preventing it that I can see. That way is a cordial union between the peoples of Europe and their racial relatives in the two Americas."

"Naval disarmament is an excellent thing for any reason. If carried out frankly, it will do much to relieve taxpayers. It is doubtful if it will abolish war."

"Julius Caesar understood disarmament in a way that could hardly be followed in these days. He cut off the right hands of the people whom he meant to disarm. That did the job effectively."

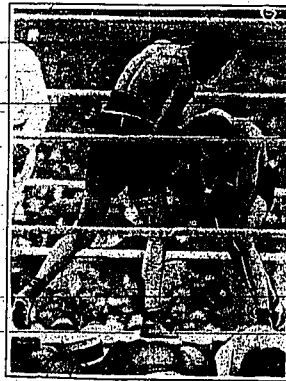
REALISM
