We have attended fairs which were perhaps a thousand times larger in every way than our fair but we have seldom if ever laid eyes on finer stock than was exhibited at the Twin Falls County Fair.

There were to be found no smoking samples of the whole harvest, stacks of grain with heavy loading cars, bundles of alfalfa that have been stored under high, white roofs of sugar beets lying on display just as they grew in the fields. Mammals numbering in the hundreds of species that made one's month weary. Orchard produce, vegetables, everything that can come from Idaho soil was there in profusion.

And as for livestock, one seldom sees better specimens than were on display at Elber. Fat, beef cattle, sleek, dairy animals, enormous hogs, sheep with coats of wool already thick since in their shearing, powerful horses—they were displayed in numbers.

Officials of the fair said the livestock exhibit was one of the big features of the fair this year and they tell one fifty low many exhibitors there were in each class until one's head swims in the figures.

And poultry—and the produce of children's clubs—and the exhibits of the women of Twin Falls county were good.

These are the things that, together with the livestock and farm produce and the farms themselves, and orchards, make the traveler to laugh at the "rainy" weather in Twin Falls.

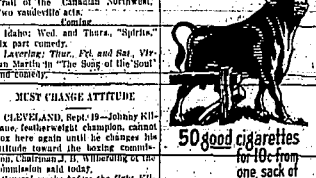
