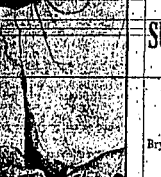

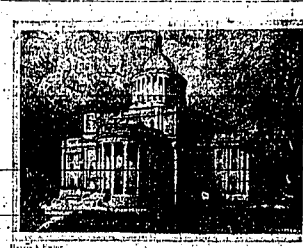

GOOD ROADS

BUILDING FEDERAL HIGHWAYS

Mileage Nearly Sufficient to Encircle the Globe When Construction is Completed.

Approved by the United States Department of the Interior, 12,000,000 miles of federal roads which have been or are being constructed, more than twice as much as the earth runs, land or water, is the chief of bureau of public roads, United States department of Agriculture.

The type of road to be used and the most suitable surface with respect to the traffic of the locality must be determined. Surface must be satisfactory, while water must be kept out of the road and maintenance there must be a careful handling both of the engineering and economic conditions for each particular project.

The mileage of federal roads which have been built or are now under construction is nearly sufficient to encircle the globe. This is the report of work accomplished since July, 1919, when the Federal government first began to build highways that are now in progress.

The general law is well known. The Department of Agriculture has set the broadest possible construction law for the purpose of providing the greatest mileage of highways to be built for the benefit of the nation.
