Just as we prayed several weeks ago, Thanksgiving day will arrive tomorrow.

Of a bird of your youth for today at least. You have something to be thankful for.

Also we will not get up Friday dawning feeling fine. Some men need to feel quite often before July 1, 1919.

There is one reason why we are glad that they are not going to serve turkey at our boarding house tomorrow: we won't have to cut back Friday.

If they had had had poultry, poultry in 1921 we might have guessed they had a hand in inducing Governor Bradford to proclaim a Thanksgiving day.

Amour & Co. says that the wholesale price of pork is lower now than it has been since 1912 and that the average price of beef is 30 cents a pound. This is for the special benefit of our boarding house keeper.

A certain Twin Falls man says that there is nothing for him to be thankful for tomorrow; that he wishes he were dead. When we offered to furnish him the means whereupon he said he will decline—without thanks.

We have often wondered what the Pilgrims had to be thankful for. Come to think of it they had no congress, no professors, no exorbitant freight and passenger rates, no politicians that promised them everything and delivered them nothing, no bachelors, vices, no refugees, no embezzlers. Yes, they had something to be thankful for when we stop and think for a second.

THANKSGIVING DAY

Three centuries ago looking two years the first Thanksgiving day was observed in the New World. Two years prior to that time, to be exact in 1621, Governor Bradford of Massachusetts had ordered a day of prayer and praise, the first ever held by the Anglo-Saxon race in America. A similar day was observed a year later. In 1621 the people were requested to observe the day in prayer for rain to relieve a long drought. Before the day set a rain fell and the day was turned into one of thanksgiving.

Following the establishment of the young free nation, congress usually passed a resolution calling on the people of the United States to observe a day of thanksgiving.

The first presidential proclamation fixing the date for the observance of the day was issued by President Abraham Lincoln in 1861 a custom which has since been followed. The credit for the issuance of the proclamation is said to belong to Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, at that time mistress of "Godey's Lady's Book."

One can readily understand why Governor Bradford might issue a proclamation for prayer but it would seem like stretching the matter a little to most of us to call it praise. The little band of pilgrims, 102 in all, had reached the bleak shores of the new world on Oct. 29, 1620, after it had taken them 63 days to cross the Atlantic.

Death claimed half of them the first winter, cold, disease and starvation had taken their toll. The hunger had brought a 100 of new help out as they came thick and praise. We of today seldom stop to think of how it has been made possible for us to live as we do. That it was through the hardships of unadvised souls. We rather, are given to complaining most of the time. If the residing angels took down all of our complaints. They would have little time for the few prayers that many, at least, of us say.

What have you to be thankful for today?
Something, if you will just stop and think for a moment you will think of thousands of things you have to be thankful for.
Years ago we visited a man, about this time of the year, who had been bed-ridden and helpless for nearly a score of years. He was thankful that he did not have rheumatism, like a neighbor who had had for a month; the neighbor in his turn was thankful that he had not had to lie in bed for years even though he was suffering great pain.
