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## TENNIS 60 PER CENT FOOTWORK



How many tennis fans pay attention to footwork? Yet it is no less important. Frank Anderson, national indoor champion, says that 60 per cent of the game is footwork. "Watch the player's starts—how they take their feet and their racket," he advises.

For those who lack the opportunity to do this he suggests the following simple rules:

In serving, stand slightly, left foot turned in and weight on left toe, enable you to follow through and go to the net with your service without waste motion. To receive, your opponent's service, stand with feet slightly apart and weight equally distributed, enabling you to move quickly in any direction. To use forehand stroke, the left foot should carry the weight and the right foot the opposite court, keep the right foot turned at a slight angle. On backhand stroke, the right foot should bear the weight and be forward, with the left at an angle. To go to the side, turn on the ball of the foot toward the side to which you are going, and stride with the other leg.

THE FIGHT ON T. B. HOSPITALS

The fight on tuberculosis hospitals started by the Ada City Taxpayers' association still continues to an unfortunate condition, proposed by nature on the state of Idaho. The state tuberculosis commission proposes to erect two hospitals, one at Payette and the other at Sandpoint. The Ada county folk, through Harry K. Fritchman, have gone into court to prevent this. Now, it is likely that the state of Idaho needs a hospital for the tubercular patients. It is equally probable that it does not need two. It is absolutely certain that it must erect two or do without any.

There is a division in this state, the result of the operation of natural forces, thousands or millions of years ago, which raised up vast mountains separating what is now called north Idaho and what is known as south Idaho. Politically, north Idaho has the better of the north, when it comes to choosing state officers, and south Idaho has enough votes to force respect for them in the legislature.

The result is inevitable. Whenever there is one state institution constructed, there are two. The idea of the Ada County Taxpayers' association in holding the construction of the buildings up until the next legislature is good if they are not needed, but bad policy if they are. It will probably only mean a delay. It is pretty certain that they will be used. The plan is, used advisedly. One clinic will not be unless some other institution can be fixed up for the action for which the T. B. hospital is not provided, to offset the advantage of the section for which it is, and the representatives of the counties in which state institutions are already established will be ready to vote and log-roll for two, in order to "make friends of the Mountain of Idiotry". In proportion to population and wealth Idaho has an undue number of state institutions and will continue to have in the future. But the mountains are there and the rock must be divided.


