The ordinary budget of the French government for this year provides for receipts and expenditures of approximately 24,700,000,000 francs. The budget, however, contemplates a deficit of 2,500,000,000 francs. In addition to the ordinary budget, the special budget provides for additional expenditures of 10,600,000,000 francs for pensions, reconstruction work and for interest on reconstruction loan. Even though France should receive the full share of all of the revenues that Germany is supposed to pay to the reparations commission this year, it would amount to only about 4,600,000,000 francs.

Great Britain had been able to balance her budget and show a surplus of revenue over expenditures, but increased materially the ratio of gold to currency notes outstanding has depressed her floating debt, has improved her balance of trade, and has been able to invest large sums of money both in foreign countries and among her colonies. While France has been able to live on 30% of these things yet her expenditures are still largely in excess of her revenues, and she still has huge sums to expend in the devastated regions of reconstruction purposes.

BILL TO KILL SKIM MILK PRODUCTS

Whether or not congress will tolerate its own prostitution by passing trade interests will soon be determined by Senate action on a bill now before the senate agricultural committee aiming to prohibit the interstate commerce of skim milk compounds. It is a bill that introduces questions of grave milk because it is the integrity of congress is involved.

As framed, the bill, H. R. 868, would prohibit traffic of skim milk compounds because they are "harmful and deleterious to public health." It was introduced by certain dairy interests which fear that the competition of skim milk compounds might result harmfully to the whole milk business. They have gone to congress and have tried to protect themselves by legislative means, a procedure which every true American must denounce as being un-American and unconstitutional.

As a matter of fact, skim milk compounds are now being manufactured by several large and responsible concerns who are doing an honest business. They are entitled to the same chance and opportunities under the laws of the land as the dairy interests or any other industry. They have put upon the markets a product of skim milk mixed with vegetable fats to be used for cooking and baking, thus utilizing vast amounts of skim milk, which are now being wasted and providing an efficient cooking, flour, chester, than whole milk and more satisfactory in many ways because of their greater shortening properties.

The dairy interests succeeded in bringing the matter before the courts of Wisconsin at which time certain facts were proved.

From surveys conducted in Philadelphia, New York and Milwaukee, it was learned that mothers do not buy skim milk compounds to feed to their infants. Such could not be done except wilfully because of the labels on the containers of the compounds, which state clearly and in large letters that the contents should not be used for infant feeding. From direct testimony by Dr. Casimir Funk, the discoverer of vitamins, it was learned that the compounds, being as they are, a mixture of pure skim milk and coconut oils are healthful, nutritious and excellent for the purpose intended and in no way harmful or a menace to public health.

The fact has been plainly proven that the point of confusion between skim milk compounds and whole canned milk is not one of nutriment; but the compounds are highly lactified, packed, sterilized and pasteurized. In spite of that, however, the dairy interests have stampeded congress with the bugaboo that the habits of the nation are being incited by the sale of these compounds. As a matter of fact, the person who would buy skim milk compounds in place of milk would be as stupid as one who would use lard in place of butter. It could not be done except wilfully.

Will the Senate allow itself to be hoodwinked by such a trade fight? Will it officially sanction the effort of business interests which seek to protect themselves by legislative means? If it does the ideals which we have called American are no, more than a name, and we must admit the advent of an era of industrial self-faiths, commercial immorality and political prostitution.

Cowester Report Shows Many Fine Herds and Individual Cows

The April report of the Pioneer steers and two Jerseys, had an ideal herds' bulletins average with 42.2% milk production per head, the number of cows tested for the month were 148. The average production of milk per cow was 20.44, the highest butterfat content was 32.28%. Thirty-six cows produced 20.44. Twenty-four produced between 20 and 22. Six produced between 20 and 22 pounds. Five produced between 16 and 18 pounds, while two produced more than 22 pounds of butterfat.

The highest milk and butter fat production was by two grade Holstein herds. No. 1 produced 3244 pounds of milk and 12.9 pounds of butterfat per head, and No. 21, 1814 pounds of milk and 12.7 pounds of butterfat per head. The best butterfat production was 32.28%.

Herd No. 11 had 11 head of grade and purchased Jersey cattle still "fall off." It will be more interesting to see what the results will be when the new herd is built up.

Twenty-eight cows were registered with an average of 47.23 pounds of butterfat per head.

The new herd, No. 21, produced 20.44 pounds of butterfat per head.

At an interesting phase of the April report was the fact that the official test in the testers on the official cows was the same as the average for all the cows.
