SHOPMEN SEEK APPEAL TO THE CIRCUIT COURT

Over Head of Attorney General and Urge Immediate Review of Ruling of Judge Wilkinson; Lawyers for Workers Play; Attorney General,

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.— National shopmen, led by the American Workers' Defense Association, their daughter's head and asked the federal court here to issue an order urging the circuit judges to review the District Court's decision "immediately."

Donald H. Biebich, attorney for the shopmen, read the appeal to the court.

The attorney declared that, under the law of 1903, the attorney general could inform the circuit judges that the administration had a "direct interest" and thereby obtain an immediate hearing.

Biebich quoted a letter from the solicitor general's office which indicated that the attorney general would not appear to appeal to the circuit judges. The attorney then declared there was no other course open to the shopmen other than to seek a writ of mandamus to inform the judges and urge quick action.

J. W. Vorel, who declined to say on the instant tomorrow, he said that he would investigate the situation but that he believed that the attorney general had the power to take the step asked by the shopmen.

DUBLIN, Oct. 5.— Captured rebels, including Michael Collins, De Valera, showing the Irish rebel leader is fed up with his losing fight against Britain, have agreed to a truce.

GLAND SURGEON DENIED HEARING AT PARIS MEET

De Vorel Refused Permission to Speak at International Gathering Because He Was Advanced in Years

PALIS, Oct. 5.— Hermann to speak at international gathering on the subject of his successful glandular operations was denied. Dr. George Kornfeld this afternoon after a series of hearings before a committee of experts.

It is almost pathetic, to watch the extremes of toil to which men in sedentary occupations resort to keep their bodies functioning healthily. Physical exercise is resort to as an antibiotic to counteract the weaknesses that inevitably is resulting from living unnatural lives.

FIRE PREVENTION SERMON

The concrete example of a vacant house which caught on fire twice yesterday afternoon in this city should focus attention on the fact that this is fire prevention week, formally called by President Harding and by nearly all the governors. There seems to have been no definite information at hand in regard to who was responsible for this fire, but the belief is that somebody was smoking in the house and got careless with matches. Vacant houses are often utilized that way, especially by boys who are violating the law.

Prosecutions in instances of that sort are, in order but it is more important for folks to learn the gravity of carelessness and make it a matter of prudence and conscience.

MEYER TALKS ON STOCK AND FARM INTERESTS

The necessity for the foundation of loan organizations and the value of co-operative marketing were emphasized by Chairman, Edward F. Meyer of the War Finance corporation before the state division of the bankers' association this week. His talk covered a wide range but what he said on this subject was of peculiar interest.

In discussing the question of live stock financing, Mr. Meyer pointed out that the industry involves a turnover of two or three and a half years and that there is no "Home" today for live stock paper of that duration. "For sure," he stated, "the industry has not been able to make a successful appeal on a broad scale to bankers outside of the live stock territory who are out of contact with the business, like those in New York, Boston, and Philadelphia—great banking centers that stand ready to furnish capital at reasonable rates on good security. No matter what form of organization for live stock financing may be developed, it is essential that the industry reconstruct its methods so as to provide that assurance of safety which will induce the bankers of the financial centers of the country to make loans on live stock as readily as they do on other commodities."

When the War Finance corporation sought agencies last fall through which it could place its funds safely and without delay, it found that new live stock loan companies with fresh capital were necessary. Such companies were organized by the bankers and business men in a number of the western live stock centers, and through them the corporation made large loans on live stock. Their capital, in large part, came from banks, and as a result, it has been brought home to us that an amendment to the national banking act permitting national banks to subscribe to the capital of live stock loan companies, might not be out of order. This would not be an entirely new idea, because a somewhat similar amendment was contained in the Edge Act.

Paper based upon the security of non-perishable commodities should be made eligible for rediscounit for the length of time necessary to market a season's product before the next harvest. The view seems to prevail in some quarters that paper in order to be liquid must have a maturity of sixty to ninety days. But a sharp distinction should be drawn between short-time bank paper and the question of the liquidity of the security that underlies bank paper, long or short.

"I believe that live stock loan companies, organized and owned locally, are the best agencies through which live stock loans can be placed. They will, in my opinion, prove to be more helpful than loan companies operating over widely extended areas, and they should be able to attract capital from the more distant points on a sound basis and at reasonable rates."

Co-operative marketing associations have a definite place in our economic structure—if they are soundly organized and competently managed, they are bound to be helpful not only to the agricultural interests themselves but in the business of the country at large. I am glad to say that the relations of the War Finance corporation with the associations to which it has made loans have been satisfactory. They have met the requirements and regulations of the corporation in a whole-hearted way and have conducted their operations in a thoroughly business-like manner in almost every case. They have not only made considerable progress in bringing about more uniform grading and classification, furnishing a better basis for credit and insuring the more efficient handling of the product, but they have erected machinery which will greatly facilitate the gradual, orderly distribution of the products
