THE COUNTY AUDIT

(By JAMES D. WHEELAN)

The Times is in receipt of a statement signed by the commissioners for the county commissioners declaring that they will have an audit of the county books later from the last audit if elected. This is a good idea; an audit should be had every year hereafter. In this connection and speaking from a purely personal point of view, I take the liberty of calling attention to certain phases of the recent discussion on this question. Some months ago it was stated in the columns of the official county publication that the present commissioners were figuring on an audit. The newspaper in question commended the idea, suggesting that it would be a means of information to the voters.

In a signed article at that time I pointed out that in order for it to benefit, voters this year it would have to be started in a very short time, that it might be completed at least three weeks before election so voters could analyze the figures furnished. I thought the idea a good one. It was quite immaterial whether it would show all the officials above criticism or whether it would show demerits or republicans' derelict or incompetent in handling of funds. The voters should know. To be of value this year it must be finished in time. Nothing was done in the matter of a public call for the lowest bidder and the time when a county audit could be completed that would be of benefit to the voters in determining the truth or falsity of current reports has long since past. I think the mistake and neither charge nor intimate any sinister purpose. Personally, I believe that since it was not taken in time to be of value at this election it would be well to start so that it can be used at the next one and on every recurring year thereafter.

LLOYD GEORGE PLAYS TO WIN

It looks as if Lloyd George will win again. The British prime minister is able to come back without war and with a substantial reduction of the demands of Venial Pashá in the face of an equivocal and luke-warm attitude on the part of France and the sharp warnings of some able military men of his own nation. He avoided a religious war among the followers of Islam and has in a measure at least maintained the prestige of the Christian nations of the west. His triumph is, therefore, a worthy one, for, as I pointed out recently, the purchase of peace with Venial Pashá at the cost of surrender of all that he demanded would have been dearly bought, and would have encouraged a Mohammedan revolt.

Under these circumstances, Austin Chamberlain, the Unionist leader, feels that the time has not come for him to get the coveted prize of premiership. He recognizes that the most radical wing of labor, might win should Lloyd George lose. Probably an election will be called soon and it is likely that the infinitely clever Welshman will win again.

At the same time, this will be simply deferring the real issue, which is an economic one. Sooner or later Lloyd-George must meet it, and in order to do so and weather the storm permanently, he must return to the stand of his old liberal days when he and Asquith pushed through the famous budget. There are budgets and budgets in England, but only one BUDGET.

The world-issue—today—an economic one—the language of Nations is the keynote in the arch. Only by world-wide co-operation and understanding can peace be secured. And when peace is secured it will be through a world-wide appreciation of the rights of man, and the abdication of privilege which feeds on misfortune.

REAL VOTES VS. STRAW VOTES

Beer and wine candidates for congress are discovering that there is a vast difference between a straw vote conducted by a newspaper or journal on the question of nullifying the Eighteenth amendment, and the real vote cast by the qualified electors.

Even New York state, conceded to be one of the wettest in the Union, showed very little sympathy with the beer and wine proposal. The drys in that state made a net gain of one congressman in the primaries and lost one state legislator.

But in the west, sentiment is so strong in favor of upholding the constitution and the Volstead law that the beer and wine candidates in a number of the congressional districts only make themselves ridiculous.

Take the Denver district for instance. A fellow by the name of Kinsel standing foursquare on a beer keg, opposed two candidates who openly espoused the cause of law enforcement and were pledged to the support of the Volstead law. The two dry candidates polled more than 7,000 votes apiece, giving Kinsel the nomination of 2,290 ballots out of the total vote. If a beer candidate can't do any better than this in a city the size of Denver, this so-called "popular uprising of the people against the Volstead law" is surely just nonsense.

The same story is told in Seattle. A fellow who answers the name of Thomas Jefferson Casey put in a vigorous campaign in that district in behalf of beer and wine. Casey didn't even finish the running. There were three other beer and wine candidates in Washington congressional districts. One of these fellows polled one per cent of total vote, one polled three per cent of the total vote, and another six per cent—American Issue.

The people are in no mood for a continued stirring up of the liquor issue by those demanding modification of the Volstead act. They expect the officers to enforce the law. They expect to elect

only those whom they propose to enforce it to public office. They regard the matter as settled, which is, by the adoption of the constitutional amendment and the passage of a bill to enforce that provision.

They are turning, as they need to turn, their attention, so far as legislation goes to economic issues and to our international relations.

It is commendable in the national administration that it has finally determined to apply to vessels under the rule of the shipping board, the time-honored principle that "American ships" are American territory and cut out hoons on them.



The reason is that the constitution is silent on the matter of education, only laudatory as to the right of parents to "raise and rear up their children, and to provide for their education that ought to be answered. I refer first to his criticism of the recent legislation in Idaho's educational field, which proposes to establish a national department of education, and then to the proposed bill of the American Legion, which proposes to establish a "parochial" school system, in addition to the public school system.

The purpose of the federal trade commission, of which ex-Senator Daniel N. Dougherty, of San Francisco, is a member, is to investigate and expose unfair practices in business. The commission, however, cannot be appealed to in behalf of, or against, the church, as the church is not a corporation, but a religious organization. There are approximately 40 growers in the meeting representing 1200 acres of potatoes.
