MAYOR TELLS RADICALS TO KEEP AWAY

Portland Authorities Issue War Warnings; City Free from Radicals and Those Arrested as Vagrants "DO NOT Resist the Officers."

PORLAND, Oct. 21.—Portland authorities have served notice to the so-called "radical" Portland. Premium rates of \$100 a day for the services of troops for duty have been taken.

Developments during the night, it became known today, were:

—A city ordinance was issued by the mayor prohibiting the watering of streets situated as the authorities saw fit.

—The mayor declared:

"DO NOT Resist the Officers."

—Major Baker wired, "Gov. Ben W. Olcott, requesting that Adjutant General White be detailed for duty here to take command of the state guard if need be. State troops may be summoned for duty in preserving order."

—Major Baker wired the head of the state police, "We have no military officials there of whom we can take care and agreed that the organization of 100 members from the state guard should be disbanded."

—More than 100 alleged vagrants rounded up during the night and the majority held for technical charges.

—Major Baker wired, "All vagrants held for technical charges action today."

Despite the warnings issued by the mayor, that the situation in Portland is not serious, the city is in a state of alarm signs of lawlessness and in making arrests of alleged vagrants have experienced trouble in bringing the

offenders to justice.

Interstate Commission Grants Construction Right to Utah Road

EFFECT OF CHEAP MARKS

(By JAMES D. WHELAN.)

The effect of cheap marks in Germany is indicated by the United Press dispatch Friday. Perhaps it would be better to say that the effect of unstable and falling marks is made evident. The trouble with the German system, like all similar systems, is that there is no bottom to the jolt. As soon as the printing presses are started, they keep on whizzing, and every effort to stop them is denounced by those who buy on credit as many always do in a period of wide speculation. If metallurgy would not present such a problem, for while this would produce a monetary expansion temporarily, yet if the people are not yet ready for them.

When the present cheap money era started in Germany, the world, which should have known better, stood aghast at the idea that labor would produce more if it got more marks, or lower purchasing value, because it was thought that the day's wages would buy less in products and the workers would dig in harder to get enough to eat. This philosophy is pretty well exploded.

Hereunder is a table, sent by mail, by the United Press from Berlin, showing the depreciation of the mark. This table, compiled by Nopwars, shows present prices of the cheapest, most desirable articles, compared with the most expensive of pre-war days. Actually present prices are much higher than the table indicates.

MIGHT ECONOMIZE ON MISREPRESENTATION

(By JAMES D. WHELAN, in New Orleans.)

Charles Sumner and his friends on the republican committee should economize on invective. At the rate they are going they will not have enough to last them until the end of the campaign. That they have some realization of this fact, is shown by their efforts to reassert old lies that were put out of commission six years ago.

The old fake has been revived about the millions of dollars lost to the farmers of Idaho by reason of the veto of a \$5,000 appropriation which it said would have prevented the spread of the alfalfa weevil had it not been vetoed.

Farmer's Bulletin 741 of the Department of Agriculture of the United States issued July 17, 1916, which is 16 months after the veto in question says:

"That no one knows exactly how the weevils spread, may be inferred from the conflicting quarantine regulations designed by uninfested states to exclude them."

A long list of these contradictory and conflicting regulations are then published.

In the pamphlet, "Fighting the Alfalfa Weevil," issued by the University Extension of Idaho, in March, 1921, it is made quite clear that there is a lot of mystery connected with the subject yet. The steady advance of the weevil is mentioned. Methods of control are detailed at length. It is made plain that really effective control work was in an experimental stage until the time of spraying, was demonstrated by the United States Bureau of Entomology in 1919.

So far as stopping the spread of the alfalfa weevil, the \$5,000 which a republican legislature appropriated and which Alexander refused to spend, might as well have been thrown into the Snake river. The defeat of a worthless, humbug appropriation always causes grief to a republican office-holder. The millions of dollars lost to the farmers is purely imaginary. The vision of a few thousand dollars of public funds has been add to near the eye that covers the landscape.

In the meantime, it is in order to suggest that persons who is frugal in the distribution of invective could save a million lire for the republican state committee publicity department and get better results.

The farmers of Idaho were not deceived by the alfalfa weevil in 1916 when it was fresh. They will not accept it when warm over.


