

JUSTICE DAY REGIONAL VIEW G.O.P. PLANS

Republican Party Plans to Appoint Tennessee Democrat as Successor so as to Control That State.

Republicans Will Then Appoint a Republican Senator to Represent Tennessee.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 24.—Justice Day of the supreme court today presented his resignation to President Harding.

The resignation is to become effective November 1st. The justice relinquishes his high judicial office so that he may devote all his time to his new work as arbitrator of American and German claims growing out of the war.

His resignation from the bench was explosively forecast by the United Press about ten days ago.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—The resignation from the supreme court today probably will give Tennessee a Republican United States senator.

In an effort to clinch the high G. O. P. gain in that state in 1920, the Republican administration here are doing its utmost to secure the appointment of Senator Shields, a Democrat, as Justice Day's successor on the bench and to name Newell Sanders, wealthy Republican lawyer, to Shields' senatorial seat.

Sanders is a candidate this year for the full six-year term against Senator Kenneth Metcalf. The indications are that he has little show of defeating Metcalf.

Justice Day is known to retain a deep affection for the work of the commission settling American claims against Germany.

Senator Shields has been the repeated candidate for the place ever since the election here in 1918. So far as has appeared here, there is only the name "Shields" that may be mentioned.

He is past the sixty year age limit for supreme court justices, and that age limit has been a field handicap. It was waived in the case of Chief Justice Taft but otherwise Attorney General Clegg and President Harding both favor Shields' appointment and no serious obstacle to his nomination as senator appears, he probably will be named.

If Sanders is appointed to the senate he will hold the seat for two years and a re-election will be held in half the place.

One of the men, Mrs. Gibson is quoted as saying, was tall and thin and dressed in a suit and tie.

The witness then fled from the scene, leaving behind a note pinned to her door in Hamilton Lane, Jersey City, that she had told such a story to the authorities.

Mrs. Gibson was retained last night while the police searched for a man who was believed to be the murderer.
