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## SPECIFIC PROOF OF SAMUELS' UNFAIRNESS

Having shown in two previous articles that there is nothing peculiar in the career of G. H. Samuels which would lead anyone to suppose that he would be more apt to carry his campaign pictures than anyone else would be, and assuming that he would make a reasonable effort to carry some of them out, including perhaps the wholly unconstitutional and therefore worse than worthless moderation pledge, which violates a principle so far forth wholly in fundamental national law, and is so construed by the courts, it behoves us to examine the statement that Samuels has been unfair in his statements.

The progressive candidate gained neither friends nor honor in his own party when he read from clippings alleged statements of Uver and Jeter, in which the first declared that Alexander told him confidentially that "no friend" the state constabulary, and the latter is reported to have said that the former governor declared himself for the cabinet form of government.

Nobody believes that Alexander ever made such statements, either for the purpose of convincing or of deceiving political foes. To quote them is absolutely unfair. "So who is the effort to make Alexander responsible for the report of Adjutant General C. N. Moody recommending the constabulary, or of Attorney General T. A. Walters, who was not even an appointee because Walters thought at one time, and so stated, that a couple of men in the service of the state he unconstitutionally used to enforce prohibition where sheriffs failed to act. Walters saw the utility of this later and explained it fully to the stumps two years ago. To say, as Samuels did, that because of these allegations, partly false and partly misleading, it would be necessary to eject him in order to abolish the constabulary of government and the state constabulary was unfair. Alexander gave credit to the republicans when here for being so tired of the last named system that they would carry out their pledge to abolish it.

In two ways Samuels was unfair in his comments on administration for the last 12 years: he failed to give credit to republicans for controlling the legislature for ten of these years, with all the responsibility that this implied, and by implying that the democrats controlled the legislative bodies six years instead of two, he placed blame for omission where it did not belong. The legislature under Governor Hawley was republican and about the only good thing it did while the governor wanted done was to pass an anti-trust law, which Miles Cannon says he can prove is being violated, or was quite recently, and which this administration refuses to enforce by prosecution. Hawley signed the letter of the law enacted out in assessments and got into an awful row with the republican sovets.

The republicans controlled both branches of the legislature when Alexander was governor the first time, when he vetoed about a million in appropriations, and reduced the tax levy. At that time an effort was made in one house to pass a budget guarantee law, and the legislature turned it down, as John D. Robertson shows in a recent retraction from an earlier erroneous statement. In 1916, Alexander was in the same position that Thomas Jefferson and Grover Cleveland were when president, and that Levee, the fusions populist, once was in as governor of Kansas; he had a majority of his own party in the legislature but some were pledged to parts of the platform and opposed to him. He got what he could, historical scholars to this day marvel because Jefferson did go without a fight many things for which he stood in order to get all he could from a legislative body. Cleveland fought and got practically nothing. The general Alexander administration in wartime was a great success. Again the question of calling a constitutional convention had been submitted to voters, as pledged by the democratic platform and it was argued that many of the things it demanded would be passed on there.

A word on taxesлевид:

The official report of State Treasurer John W. Engleman for the biennium ending September 20, 1920, contains a statement of state taxes levied under the administrations of Haines, Alexander and the first of Davis. This differs somewhat from appropriations made. In 1913, under Haines, taxes collected amounted to \$28,420,10; in 1914 under Haines they amounted to \$25,192,29; in 1915, under Alexander, they amounted to \$62,628,15; in 1917 under Alexander, they reached, owing to war prices and necessary necessities, \$711,772,29, still \$114,000 under the Haines minimum. In 1918, when war expenses were piling up and everything cost a lot of money taxes rose to \$1,129,245,62, for the first time being higher than the Haines.

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## RAILROAD TALK IS REVIVED AFTER BIG REACTION SLUMPS

Many think that Wolfe Told More Than He Meant. That He May Be Right. But the Western Men seem to indicate Clear Relationship and Deliberate Cooperation of the Western Pacific with Idaho Central.

Failure of the officials of the Western Pacific to officially confirm the claims made by Conrad Wolfe at the meeting of business leaders in the city, the officials of the T. C. & Western, who were meeting, created a strong reaction yesterday which, however, showed signs of abating.

It was pointed out by many that the denial might be because Wolfe was present, and in his statements of course, he did not say anything that he thought when made were intended to be given out. It is recalled that great care was taken by the Western Pacific to cut their own statements from headquarters and that "where statements are made preteritively, they are denied." It is also recalled that the Western Pacific made such denials. Some time since a denial was made where all the denial was that the Western Pacific, in view of this character, has caused the lifting of the temporary depression of the market.

Others maintained that all this is mere "speculation. Other speculators say that it is true, and that the Western Pacific is interested in any way, although not varying instruments to Wolfe, when it knew from press references that he had been asked to make such a statement.

It is noted that with the question was raised here as to whether the Idaho Central and the Western Pacific had agreed at Lakewood, and whether it is true the 40 point rate were heavy enough,

Wolfe is a member of the Union Pacific, which is now convinced that the Western Pacific is trying to build up its own line in Idaho, and in collusion with Wolfe and the Idaho Central Pacific, to keep the Western Pacific from getting control of the Central Pacific as well as the Western Pacific's controlling road would be a blow to the Central Pacific, those favoring this view when asked to explain the apparent interest of the Western Pacific in the Idaho Central.

Both the two roads were working together; that Nibley, ex-C. R. & L. City was a director of the Western Pacific, and interested at the time in the Central Pacific line, and that through his influence they instruments might have been loaned to the Central Pacific, the circumstances noted given out, in order to camouflage the Union Pacific proposed activities.


Ready for Last Week of Campaign
