The soundness of this policy is shown by the following figures: During the period July 1, 1927, to July 1, 1932, 175,000 tuberculin tests were made instead of a milk average there has been a remarkable increase in both production and consumption of milk and dairy products. Last year, 1931, milk production in the United States aggregated nearly 30 billion pounds, an increase of 10 per cent over the previous year. Production of butterfat likewise increased. In 1931 alone, milk cows produced 24,000,000 pounds of milk, a figure nearly twice as great as the slaughter of tuberculous cattle during the entire five year period.

People Use More Milk

Several hundred towns have passed regulations requiring tuberculin testing and apparently with ingested fully in the safety and value of milk as a food, people are using more of it than at any time in the past. Many Producers Handle Cows in Same Manner as High-Producing Dairy Animals.

The function of beef cattle is to convert cheap ruminants into a product that can be utilized by man. Many years entering the business of beef production make the vital mistake of handling their beef cows in the same manner that a high-producing dairy cow is managed, and because they fail to realize a profit, condemn the beef business generally. The same thing would happen, however, to the dairy business if dairy herds were subjected to the conditions necessary for profitable beef production. The only difference is that few dairy herds are ever placed under these conditions. In managing a herd of beef cattle, the most expensive in the form of labor equipment and concentrate feeds must be kept at a minimum if a reasonable profit is to be realized.

TO ESTABLISH COLOR GRADES

Samples Are Being Submitted by Breeders to Establish Rank of Extracted Article.

Samples of honey are being received by the United States Department of Agriculture from breeders in all parts of the country in connection with the work of establishing reliable color grades for extracted honey. A new type of spectrometer will be used in this work, which will be done by agriculturalists of the department in cooperation with the division of grades and standards of the bureau of agricultural economics.
